
The Division of Student Affairs provides a network of co-curricular programs, services, and activities that directly support the institution's mission-based objectives.

Career development and job preparations
provide opportunities for students to practice communication skills, critical
thinking, reasoning, and decision-making in situations outside of the classroom.
For instance, the University Career and Graduate Fairs provide opportunities

for seniors and pre-seniors to meet and talk with prospective employers and graduate school representatives about career opportunities.



Knowledge acquired in the classroom is also supported and enhanced through co-curricular activities such as the Resume Writing and Interview Skills Workshops which offer students a chance to reflect on career goals and preparations and practice job search skills and techniques.



The co-curricular portfolio (which includes a co-curricular transcript) is also a mechanism by which students have the opportunity to display their involvement with campus activities. The transcripts allow students to chronicle their leadership development and other co-curricular activities, the ways that they have used the "Dimensions of Development," and how their out-of-class learning has served to enhance their in-class experiences.




Student Leadership Development offers opportunities to learn effective leadership skills via involvement in student organizations including clubs and student government and attendance at leadership trainings and retreats. Student leaders are able to draw on skills learned in classes such as communication, organization,

management and problem solving to address real issues of concern to students.

Other examples of co-curricular programs include, "Be a part from the Start" and the EOP Summer Bridge Critical Thinking Presentation.

Still other examples of the Division of Student Affairs co-curricular programs include its cultural and international celebrations series that introduces the



campus community to diverse cultures and worldviews. Similarly, the division supports the Multicultural and Women's & Gender Student Center (MWGSC). It also partners with Academic Affairs under CMLE to bring curricular and cocurricular education together in a way that allows for collaboration on student learning inside and outside the classroom.
