Dear Constituents;

Thank you for your continuing interest in a Sustainable future. I have much to report and hope you will individually find a way to become involved with the Council through one of our many projects or by launching a project your self.

Sustainability Conference on August 24, 1999 – It was a great success. We had 60 people for dinner and 30 to 40 others who joined us during the evening. We had numerous elected officials as well as business and environmental folks. The press coverage was so good that we rated an editorial in the LA Times in the Sunday, August 29th edition.

In case you were unable to attend, we had three speakers discussing a range of issues relating to sustainability followed by audience participation in a discussion of possible sustainability indicators. This part of the program was an

energetic exchange between most of the audience and was recorded on paper (and attached), but not on the radio air waves as was the first portion of the program (KCLU). This lively discussion of indicators was a prelude to the



Council's grant with CSUN to identify quality of life indicators. Additional discussions will be held this Fall lead by a number of folks from Southern California who have direct experience developing and implementing indicators. sustainable approach given the Council's board member's dislike of licking envelopes.
Past Projects – We do not want to bore you with what you may already know, but in case you are unaware of the activities and projects that we have sponsored they are listed below:
Co-hosted with the U. S. Navy two conferences on sustainability organized by the President's Council on Sustainability.
Sponsored a design cherette for the interpretive center planned for Mugu Lagoon.
Sponsored a conference on Sustaining Dialog in Contentious Times at the County Government Center.
Sponsored a conference on energy deregulation and its implications for local government and businesses.
Sponsored a debate between opposing parties on the issue of sales tax collection and how it impacts land use decisions.
Incorporated on
The organization or its members have contributed several articles and letters to local papers on sustainability issues.
Made the first of an annual award to people who have made a significant contribution to the cause of sustainability.
Projects in Process - We have many projects under way that I would like to share with you and invite you to participate in.
Sustainability Indicators Grant & dash; This was discussed above as part of the conference, but it bears repeating. The Council received a grant in association with Cal State Northridge (CSUN) which will fund among other things
the development of sustainability indicators. We would like to have a broad cross section of people from across the county (ideally representation from each city) so that we can learn about the value of such indicators and then set about
developing appropriate ones for the county as a whole, but also particular indicators for each city. Join us in this project. Contact at if you are interested in this project.
Greenbelt Forums – The Council is partnering with the League of Women Voters to hold public forums on behalf of the County Board of Supervisors which will allow the public to express their ideas on how the existing greenbelts that abut most cities can be strengthened. The meetings have not yet been scheduled, but if you are interested Contact at if you are interested in this project.
Faulkner House Group –: The Council convened a meeting with representatives of several County-wide

Faulkner House Group – The Council convened a meeting with representatives of several County-wide organizations to explore how Measure A could be advanced.

Public Education Follow-up to Measure A – Remember Measure A that was on the ballot last year with the SOAR initiative? It was overwhelmingly adopted by the voters and generally supported by parties on both sides of the

SOAR initiatives. One of the recommendations in the Measure was public education on key land use issues that relate to development patterns and farming. The Council is working with a consortium of other interest groups to develop a coordinated approach to the education mandate. As our efforts take shape in September, we hope to invite the public to advise and comment on our efforts. Stay tuned.



Research/educational Consortium -

Moebi Awards – The Council gave a hand-crafted award to an individual who it considered made an outstanding contribution to the cause of sustainability. This was John Krist, columnist for the Ventura Star who chronicled his

30,000 mile journey around the country examining local communities' efforts at promoting sustainable solutions to problems they faced. We hope the extensive series of articles will be republished soon. (Call the Star to urge

the way a "Moebi" is the name we gave our award (a moebius strip custom fabricated of

recycled silver). The strip was chosen because of its continuos form that, unlike a circle, completes a revolution in 720 degrees while having one side and one edge.

Web Master – As mentioned earlier, the use of conventional paper and envelopes and stamps to communicate with you is not a sustainable practice (we do not want any more envelop stuffing parties as much as we enjoy each

others company). It is also unnecessarily wasteful of resources when there is a better alternative. We hope you will all join us in a paperless organization by giving us your e-mail address (we won't say it again) and by helping

We have a site currently, but need someone to manage it and evolve it into "all that it can be." We would like it to be a place where we can post news of meetings, suggested readings, other web sites, pending legislation and general news of the organization that would allow you all to more easily be involved. We know that right person is out there, now you know we are looking for him or her. Give us some names.

Organizational Changes

Advisory Board – As the Council has evolved, the Board of Directors has created an Advisory Board of individuals and organizations who wish to play a particularly close role in advancing sustainable issues without serving on

the Board of Directors. This new body would meet periodically with the Directors to discuss the direction of the organization and on an ad hoc basis to advise the Directors on specific projects and opportunities that arise. If this is of

Formal Memberships and Dues – Thus far the organization has been run on the sweat and finances of it Directors. As we become more engaged in various projects and try to expand our communication with our constituents,

we have found that we will need more funds. As an individual who has expressed a past interest in sustainability issues, we invite you to become a member and pay modest annual dues that will be used to cover expenses relating to

copying charges, maintenance of an e-mail address and a mailing address as well as an active web site.

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT: WHAT PEOPLE WANT

The quality of life in Ventura County is an on-going concern of its residents, but in a surprising way. Nearly 100 citizens and elected officials from around the county attended the Ventura County Sustainabilty Council's August 24th conference on, "How Do We Measure Quality of Life." Billed as the initial step in a grant-funded study conducted jointly by the Council and California State University at Northridge, the conference stimulated brisk

discussion amongst those present and prompted scores of suggestions on how to measure the quality of life in Ventura County. The Council recently completed its analysis of the suggestions and made a surprising finding.

Where quality of life has largely been measured in light of growth and development patterns, a significant number of suggested measures centered instead around the quality of civic life. Perhaps the recent adoption of new growth control measures throughout most of the county have freed people to consider the quality of other aspects of their daily lives.

Among the comments forwarded that reflect this emerging emphasis on the quality of civic life were the following: gauge people's sense of freedom to participate openly in their communities' affairs; assess the amount

of interpersonal contact and dialog among citizens; quantify the number and per capita size of public commons; measure the amount of discretionary personal time; catalog the range of educational opportunities available; evaluated the

health of public libraries; and identify levels of care and concern expressed for one another.

"The level of interest in civic engagement was unexpected," remarked Council Member	
"Perhaps it reflects the public's growing confidence in the way that growth and development may be	
handled,	

thus freeing them to focus on other meaningful facets of daily life, not the latest subdivision or the density of redevelopment." The importance of civic engagement as a measure of quality of life in Ventura County will continue to be

tested as the Sustainability Council sponsors further dialogues where the public will be invited to help define indicators of a quality life. Stay tuned.

Communications with members

Rather than rely on paper and postage and the energy to assemble them to communicate, the organization should operate via a web site (which we have) and e-mail. Our membership should be so trained as well. The health of the organization should be a first priority. It should not be hobbled by past ways of communicating with its members. If people want to belong to the organization they should be willing to use a modern system to do so.

The board should communicate by e-mail as often as by phone. We should pass around copies of work to review by e-mail so we can move quickly on opportunities. For example, press releases need to be quickly sent to be topical.

Thus, the writer should post the release to the rest of the Board who should respond promptly or forego criticism of the effort later.

Our web site should be up-dated daily if necessary to keep interested people informed of the organization's efforts. It should also be a clearing house for sustainability issues and opportunities. Ideally we could trust the public to

post messages on a message board, but perhaps we should exercise oversight of such a board at first.



Sustainable Systems and Choices

A system is sustainable if it can persist for extended periods of time if not indefinitely. The system can be a society, an economy, a biological region, etc. Sustainability does not imply a static system, but rather one in dynamic balance that is constantly adjusting to changing conditions. Such change is always necessary because a given system is inexorably linked to other systems, each of which must adjust to changes (however small) that are emanating from other systems.

Because this mix of interactions is so complex, it cannot be fully understood or consequences totally predicted. As a result, there is seldom an absolute choice to be made between limited options that will be clearly lead to a more certain sustainable outcome than other choices. For example, is a traditional wooden pencil a more sustainable choice than a mechanical pencil with replaceable lead? A complete analysis of the alternatives would be exhausting if one

were to assess all the implications of the choice as they span the biological, economic, and social systems.

Consequently, practicing sustainability is matter of selecting the best of the options available in an on-going quest to produce more sustainable outcomes. The Sustainability Council is about promoting decisions that lead to the most sustainable outcomes… over and over again because there is no final choice that can be sustainable for all time.

An Working Definition of Sustainability

Distilling the concept into a working definition that is human oriented we can say,

Sustainability is the ability to meet our present needs without

Compromising the ability of future generations to meet their's.

Applying this maxim would suggest that we leave enough fish in the sea so that fisheries can survive to feed future generations; that we do not contaminate our water making it undrinkable for our children's children; that we do

not squander a nation's wealth in the pursuit of the frivolous leaving future generation with crushing debt.

Guiding Principles of Sustainability

A working definition of sustainability will take us so far in assessing the choices that will lead to outcomes that are more or less sustainable than the current situation. Seemingly simple choices can be agonizingly difficult if pursued to the nth degree, so what can we rely on to more accurately guide our choices than the working definition cited above? Paradigms built around natural systems and physical laws provide the prime guidance augmented by some modern

assessment tools.

From the natural or biological realm come:

Preserving and enhancing diversity

Conservation of energy

From the realm of physical laws come thermodynamic laws which are expressed in the Swedish program of "Natural Step":
