Car crash to be staged on campus March 12

On Wednesday, March 12 around 1:15 p.m. a pre-recorded 911 call will trigger an emergency response by law enforcement, and firefighters and paramedics to respond to a simulated car crash in front of the Bell Tower. Each emergency agency will use this drill as a training exercise to simulate a real response.

The crash simulation is part of the activities planned for Wednesday, March 12 for and event titled "Every 15 Minutes." Every 15 Minutes brings together a broad coalition of interested constituents with the goal of reducing alcohol-related incidents among students. Through the means of an Office of Traffic Safety Mini-Grant, CSUCI is partnering with the Ventura County Fire Department and other local agencies to ensure a safe community. During the day, CSUCI volunteer students known as "living dead" will go to their classes and be on campus with painted white faces and event t-shirts. Throughout the day the "living dead," sometimes taccompanied by the Grim Reaper, will place tombstones in a temporary cemetery on the Bell Tower Mall lawn to represent that every 15 minutes a person is killed or seriously injured from an alcohol-related car crash. Some of the "living dead" will be the victims of the car crash simulation.

Along with the Every 15 Minutes event, the AWARE Virtual Reality simulator will be at the Bell Tower Mall, which will give the campus community the opportunity to drive a simulator car that recreates a driving-while-intoxicated experience.

OLLI-CSUCI announces spring program

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute has opened enrollment for its spring 2008 class session. OLLI will have 14, eight-week classes for persons over 50 at five county locations. Each class meets once a week for two hours. Classes are intended for intellectual stimulation; there are no tests, grades, or college credit.

Spring classes begin the week of March 31. Most classes are held on campus, but some are offered in Ventura (Mondays), Ojai (Wednesday mornings), Simi Valley (Wednesday evenings) and Thousand Oaks (Saturday mornings). Spring courses include Eastern Religions, Beethoven, Generations in America, Origins of Science, Einstein for Everyone, History of Jazz, Folk Music of Europe, Globalization, Marine Biology, 20th Century California, Pulitzer Prize winning Plays, and more.

Registration ends at the beginning of the first spring classes, but early enrollment is encouraged as some classes reach their maximum enrollment quickly. Unlimited membership permits enrollment in an unlimited number of courses each session if space allows, with a fee of \$125 per session (discount to CSUCI employees).
