Dr. Sawyer was honored at a recent UNT celebration, which was part of a yearlong observance of the 50th anniversary of the university's desegregation.

Faculty Kudos

• Jacque Kilpatrick, professor of English and chair of the English Department, was awarded a prestigious National Endowment for the Humanities fellowship to work with actors and American professors of English and theater from across the nation on Shakespeare's Plays in Performance and Production. Prof. Kilpatrick will spend the summer in London, working primarily at the rebuilt Old Globe Theatre where many of Shakespeare's plays were first performed.

Prof. Kilpatrick has also been writing extensively, including: a new book, *Louis Owens: Literary Reflections on His Life and Work* (University of Oklahoma Press), available in June; the 2nd edition of *Celluloid Indians* (University of Nebraska Press), to be published in the fall; a chapter, "The Last of the Mohicans: Adaption and Transmutation of the National" in *Literature and Film: A Reader* (Robert Stam and Assesandra Rengo, editors, Blackwell Publishing), to be published this month; and "Native Americans in Film" in the *Columbia Companion to American History on Film* (Columbia University Press), published this month.

In addition, Prof. Kilpatrick was interviewed in March by the BBC for a documentary titled "Colouring the Media."

- Liz King, assistant professor of art, was awarded first prize and \$500 at the 11th annual Santa Barbara Printmakers' competition and exhibition, April 3, 2004. King's print was voted best out of 100 entries submitted for juried review. Her work will be displayed at the Faulkner Art Gallery in the Santa Barbara Library through April 30.
- Cynthia Davis, lecturer in English, won the Black History Month Poetry Contest at SBCC.
- Christina Pages, lecturer in English, is in the process of publishing a book of poetry through Watermark Press. She has also given several local poetry readings.
- Julia Balen, assistant professor of English, has an article that will be published in the *Women's Review of Books*. The article, "Remembering Wittig," reviews the importance of Monique Wittig's life work.

- Renny Christopher, associate professor of English and academic chair, has recently published poetry, essays, and an article. Campus Construction Report

Here is the status of current projects:

- The widening of the South Quad entrance from Ventura Drive is now complete, with the entrance meeting ADA standards. The University thanks faculty, staff, and students for their patience.
- The renovated Administration Building has been given a new life. CSUCI crews will be making many more final touches in the next few weeks. The new parking lot is ready and in use. Dumpsters have now been placed in the building's parking lot. The University thanks Peggy Hinz, director of Communications and Marketing, Elizabeth Velasco, executive secretary to the president, and David Carlson, associate architect, for helping to coordinate the moves of many staff members.
- Construction of the student housing project continues. Roof tiling and application of exterior stucco will soon be completed. Installation of sheetrock, floors, fire sprinklers, and plumbing, as well as wall texturing and painting have been completed in some buildings and are in progress in others. Irrigation and hardscape installation has begun. Another reminder: faculty, staff, and students are asked to drive carefully since construction trucks regularly use Potrero Road and Oxnard Street. The project remains on schedule and within budget.
- Phase 3 of University Glenn has started.
- Lighting is now being installed in the temporary Santa Paula parking lot.
- A substantial crane will be used to lift the monopole for the campus cell site which is being installed this week. The work impacts the end of Rincon Drive and the area around the Conference Halls.
