

# New Master of Science Program Planned for 2005

The scope of the University's academic programs continues to grow with the announcement of a new master of science program in biotechnology and bioinformatics, which will be launched by the Extended Education Division during the 2005 academic year. The two-year program responds to a strong regional demand since approximately 40 percent of the national biotechnology and bioinformatics businesses are located in California. A degree in these specific areas has not been offered in Southern California until now. The program, directed by Nicole Bournias, visiting professor of biology, will prepare students for rewarding careers in laboratory research, regulation of drug approval and other biotechnology applications; positions in management and at companies that are investing in biotechnology; and working for biotechnology law firms.

## Foundation Creates Faculty Grants, Donates Equipment

The University's Foundation is actively contributing to the University's mission through major gifts and programs. Recently, the organization established twelve faculty innovation and excellence grants for 2004, which will enable faculty members to purchase equipment and pursue projects. The grants were supported by \$60,000 from the \$5 million Martin V. Smith Endowment Fund.

Receiving grants are Mary Adler, assistant professor of English; Simone Aloisio, assistant professor of chemistry; Rainer Buschmann, assistant professor of history; Geoff Dougherty, professor of physics; Jesse Elliott, assistant professor of mathematics; Matthew Furmanski, assistant professor of art; Scott Frisch, assistant professor of political science; Jill Leafstedt and Maria Denny, assistant professors of special education (joint project); Joan Peters, assistant professor of English, and Nian-Sheng Huang, associate professor of history, chair of the program (joint project); Paul Rivera, assistant professor of economics; Ashish Vaidya, professor of economics and director of the MBA program, and Irina Costache, associate professor of art history (joint project); and William Wolfe, professor of computer science and chair of the program.

The board also donated \$85,000 to ITS for the purchase of computers. Two classrooms and an open lab have received 60 of the latest computers, including 17-inch flat-screen monitors.
