## New board elected

The final phase of the 2012 election process within Leisure Village came off without a hitch, and 1,204 homeowners — 56.4 percent of the eligible voters — exercised their right by casting their votes for members seeking the two open seats.

John Mayer easily won a re-election bid with 802 total votes. Ted Lansing received 846, Joyce Baker 406 and Robert Kulick came in with 129.

The tax related referendum identified as 76-04 on the ballot also received favorable support with a vote of 984 in support and 25 opposed. Had this ballot measure not passed, the Leisure Village Association would have faced increased federal taxes, and the staff at ILV therefore wishes to thank those who voted in favor of the measure, thereby saving homeowners money.

At the working board meeting that followed on the heels of the Annual Meeting, Jerry Rosen was re-elected as president, Don Marquardt as vice president, Ted Lansing as treasurer, John Mayer as secretary and Bob Ellis will remain director at large.

Last but not least, ILV staff sends congratulations to those who won in the election, thanks for participating to those that that were unsuccessful in their bids, and a special thanks to Lin Grant for serving as a director for the past four years.

## A clean sweep: 5-ton vehicle keeps Village streets debris-free

### \$92,000 machine means outsourcing is over

Say hello to the latest Leisure Village acquisition: a Tymco model 210 street sweeper weighing in at just under 5 tons!

For as long as anyone can remember, LV has been outsourcing the task of keeping our streets clean at an annual cost, in recent years, of \$22,000. And for that price, the streets are swept just once a month. In 2010, the Purchase Research Committee, after a detailed investigation headed by Tim Hughes, recommended purchasing our own unit. At the time, while the board looked favorably on the idea, funds were not available.

Fast forward to 2012, funds were budgeted and the unit was purchased for a total cost of \$92,000. Several of our existing staff members have been trained on the use of the machine, and our staff mechanic has been trained on its care. At the historical rate of usage, the cost payback would be just 4.5 years; however, General Manager Bob Scheaffer now plans on sweeping twice a month. In addition, the unit is available for cleanup whenever we are hit with a sudden storm.

The result: A cleaner Leisure Village and a two-plus-year payback period — a win all around.

For those interested in the design details of the unit, the Model 210 is the only lot sweeper on the market that uses a true Regenerative Air System with a high-efficiency multipass, cylindrical, centrifugal dust separator to clean the air before it passes to the blower. The blower is then coupled to a controlled jet of air that dislodges dust and debris from the street before it is vacuumed into the holding tank.

## Complaints about pool work are all wet

The recent disruption and closure of the swimming pool at Leisure Village provides a reminder to residents and staff alike that repair and maintenance of facilities constitute ongoing needs in a community that is almost 40 years old.

Beginning with visible signs of deterioration in the cement decking, noticeable increase of sand and other debris in the pool filters — and accompanied by an official notification from the Ventura County Environmental Health Division that the problem must be addressed in a timely manner — the pool was subsequently closed and repairs made using funds available from the reserve account.

It is interesting to note that little action in our community goes without criticism from the Monday morning quarterbacks and other self- proclaimed experts that call Leisure Village home. The closing of the swimming pool during the heat of the summer season is no exception.

Recent complaints received by staff for this project included a suggestion that all the decking be replaced at one time as opposed to a piece-meal approach, notwithstanding the fact that some sections of the decking are not yet in need of replacement, but probably will need attention a year or two down the road. (Chlorine is tough on cement.)

Others believe that the work should take place during the winter months when the pool receives less use, irrespective of the fact that the work is tied into an overall annual cement contract that includes sidewalks, driveways and other associated needs throughout the community.

An evaluation by staff over the years has suggested that completing

the pool work independently and/or addressing all cement related needs during the winter would be more costly for a variety of reasons.

Also, several onlookers noted that construction activity ceased for some four days in the middle of the project, thereby delaying the time for the estimated one-week closure to almost two weeks. Records show, however, that the delay was due to the necessity for a government employee to physically inspect the project after the foundation was set, but before the cement could actually be poured, as opposed to any laziness or fault of the contractor.

In retrospect, the good news is that the pool is once again open, but the bad news is that the decking around the spa is due for replacement next year, and we can therefore expect to hear many of the same complaints once again.

But then complaining keeps some folks busy and out of other mischief.

## 63 percent of Village's registered voters cast ballots June 5

According to preliminary figures, the percentage of registered Village voters who voted in the June 5 primary was nearly three times that of Ventura County and almost double that of Camarillo's percentage of registered voters.

The results, which had not been certified as of the time of this report, showed 63.3 percent of the Village's 2,472 registered voters cast ballots in the two precincts that serve the Village exclusively. Ventura County's turnout was 24.5 percent of nearly 407,000 registered voters; Camarillo's was 34.6 percent of its 38,595 voters. Coincidentally, when you break out the Village turnout, it represents more than 10 percent of Camarillo's total, the kind of participation that might send a message of importance to area politicians: Leisure Village voters do count!

## Fix-it projects can boost value

During these warm, sunny days, many homeowners begin projects around the house. In the past, some of those projects have been cleaning, general maintenance, painting, larger home improvements or maybe even complete remodeling. All of these maintain, or in many cases, add to the value of your home.

Due to the nature of the Leisure Village community, property values are dependent on the overall exterior maintenance of all of the homes in the complex. If the home has "Red Stake" (custom) landscaping, now may be a good time to plant, trim and remove weeds and leaves.

One project that really enhances the value of a homeowner's property, and the overall development as well, is the replacement or removal of older wood fences where the wood materials have been damaged substantially by termites or wood fungus and/or dry rot. The Leisure Village Association has a list of properties that are seen from Leisure Village Drive or Mountain View Drive that require fencing to block the patio visibility from the street. Your property may not require a fence.

Another relatively affordable maintenance project that may increase property value is the replacement of the original wooden garage doors with the new moremodern roll-up sectional metal doors.

There are many other projects that are being made by Leisure Village owners to make their homes more enjoyable and to increase the value of their investment. Please remember that any modifications to the exterior of our homes require Architectural Committee approval and permit.

## Real estate market picks up

Yes, the real estate market in Leisure Village — and actually all of Ventura County — has been very active in the past few months. Available homes are unusually limited. There are currently significantly more buyers than sellers.


As I write this today, June 11, 53 homes have sold in the past three months in our Village, representing a potential turnover rate of 10 percent annually. We now have only 13 active listings. The general average of available homes has been 40 to 45.

This is truly a seller's market. Anytime a commodity is in short supply with high demand, it sells very quickly. People often tell me that they are considering moving to a place offering meals, socialization and transportation — much as they love Leisure Village and the comfort of their home. A few years ago when there were many more houses on the market for sale, buyers had more choices and it sometimes took longer to sell a home.

## Crackling crackers add spice for a summer treat or work as ideal coating for chicken

We may have missed the Fourth of July, but you don't have to miss out on culinary firecrackers.

Here's a summer "no-cook" recipe for crackling crackers that are great served alone with something tall and cool to drink. You can also serve them with chili or slices of cheese.

They're very easy, but do follow the directions to let the crackers sit overnight. That's what ignites them! You can use less spice if you like. And if you have leftovers, crush them up for a great coating for chicken breasts!

I will warn you that this recipe is high in sodium. It's a definite splurge! If you're watching your sodium intake, it's better to watch fireworks on TV.

#### **California Firecrackers**

- 1 1/3 cups extra virgin olive oil
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- 2 one-ounce envelopes of dry Ranch Dressing mix (or use one Ranch and one Italian)
- 2 to 3 Tablespoons red pepper flakes\* One-pound box of unsalted or low-
- salt saltine crackers, multigrain or regular (You will need all 4 sleeves of crackers!)

\*Watch out! Start with 1 to 2 tablespoons of the red pepper flakes, but some like it hot!

Use a large 1-1/2 to 2 gallon plastic bag. Open the bag, holding it open wide over a shallow bowl. Pour in the olive oil. In a small bowl, combine the dry ingredients and place them in the olive oil. Close the bag and, using your hands, knead and massage the ingredients together, combining the oil and seasonings. Now, carefully place all the crackers in the bag. Yes, all of them!

Reseal the bag and turn the bag over and over again, coating the crackers with the oil-seasoned mixture. The more you do this, the better the coverage is.

Then let the bag sit at room temperature for one hour and then turn it again a few more times. Allow the bag to sit for at least 12 hours or, better yet, overnight. Serve in a bowl or basket lined with 2 or 3 paper napkins.

Any leftovers can be stored in a covered plastic container.

## 97-year-old Village resident tutors elementary school kids

"I am a rich man. My pay is a smile," says Ben Racowsky as he chats about his life.

A resident of Leisure Village for 15 years, Ben is sitting in his living room, a rare quiet moment for this busy volunteer. He tutors elementary school students three days a week. He teaches a Hebrew class in the Village, is a greeter at the Herzog Winery and goes to Temple every day. An amazing schedule, particularly because Ben is 97 years old.

"I believe that each of us has a core of goodness," he explains.

It's a lesson from his mother that he follows daily.

Ben's core is particularly bright at Tierra Linda Elementary School, where Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays he tutors dozens of kids who have trouble mastering the basics of math.

"When they get behind in multiplication or division in the third or fourth grade, they might never catch up," Ben says. "So they come into my

room in small groups, and we work together."

He describes how the students light up when they succeed. "Kylie – a third grader – shouted 'I got it!' the first time she got the right answer in long division. Now she's dividing five figures."


"Mr. R (as they call him on campus) makes a huge difference," reports Tierra Linda Principal June Pack. "The teachers notice; student scores improve when kids are tutored by him."

He's been "a very big part of our school," she says, ever since he just walked on campus five years ago and said, "I'm here to help."

Mr. R. needs no guidance; he knows how to do it. That, Ben confesses, is because he flunked math in grade school, then took it over until he "became great at it." It's no accident that one of his sons teaches math in college.

His Leisure Village Hebrew class began 15 years ago because, as a newcomer, he wanted to meet people. Ben and his students have not stopped yet. He's proud of his Jewish tradition, attending Temple every day. That's where he met David Herzog, who soon recognized Ben's special attitude and invited him to help greet guests at tastings at the Herzog Wine Cellars.

## Communication — written and televised — thrives in Village



Although we may not be quite as artistic or adventuresome here in

Leisure Village, the Association has nevertheless focused considerable attention on implementing effective measures for communication as a high priority. Not only are monthly board meetings televised live on closed circuit television, but also tapes of the meetings are frequently played on a number of occasions and at various times during the week. A revolving screen on LVTV also runs 24 hours a day, seven days a week, displaying activity schedules and important messages. The lobby of the Recreation Center (not clubhouse, thank goodness) also provides a shorter version of the announcements as well as appropriate posters in the lobby, not to mention other information found on bulletin boards.

Written communication includes the monthly Village Voice that is sent to all residents and homeowners, regardless of where they live, and occasional special letters and other written correspondence as needed. Although not legally tied to the Association, ILV provides announcements and messages from clubs and other groups, in addition to other pertinent information as deemed appropriate. And the newest and most modern method of communication may be found in the email news as envisioned and implemented twice a month under the urging and subsequent guidance of Ernie Ohmstedt, chairman of the all-important Education and Recreation Committee.

The bottom line is that you don't need to look for smoke, wait for a runner or listen for the beat of the drums in an effort to be in the know about activities in our community, simply because the messages are not only all around, but also abound in many forms. 



moved here from their home near St. Louis, Cathy counted 180 boxes on the moving van and remembers (with a smile) that Pat signed up for the Finance Committee before they were all unpacked. A career in financial services and as comptroller for several corporations engaged him for decades.

"I was not a CPA," he explains. "I didn't want to spend my life just checking other people's figures. So I did what I liked — designing better systems."

The attraction to the Leisure Village Finance Committee was a natural.

Natural and time-consuming. When Pat estimates that he spent about 20 hours a week on Finance Committee work, Cathy laughs at his underestimation. His "desk" is the dining room table, usually piled high with papers and columns of numbers, particularly from October until January when he worked every day as the annual budget for Leisure Village was assembled. That process — a cooperative one between LV staff and the Finance Committee — has yielded solid documents.

"Pat asks very good questions," reports Rosen, "which help us stay strong."

"I'll always be involved in Village activities," says Pat with an eye to the long-range LV Master Plan and to promoting a program that would make planned giving more attractive to residents.

And what does Pat Busch think should be changed here?

He laughs.




