

Dispelling rumors about Master Plan

I am still hearing questions here and there that suggest there are some confused folks in the Village. I refer, of course, to the Ad Hoc Planning Committee's Master Plan.

We tried to keep the process of developing it transparent by holding open

meetings, and we've been busy disseminating information. We still have copies available to read in the Library, the Admin Office and the Rec Office. But in an attempt to make it as simple as possible, let me explain it here in short form as I try to dispel a few rumors.

An Active Senior Community

First of all, this is not a

single project that we're asking the Board to vote on and then raise funds to complete all at once. It is a series of projects that we chose and ranked in importance of need. We then divided them into phases that would be considered, modified as needed, funded, completed and then evaluated before

moving on to another project.

For example, the first phase is the Annex. A plan was approved more than five years ago to upgrade the building and improve its look and functionality. I hope we can bring the goals, if not the same exact plan, to fruition. Please see MASTER on 10



WHAT'S COOKIN' IN THE VILLAGE Latkes! Latkes! And latkes!

"Gather round the table, I'll give you a treat, dreidels to play with and latkes to eat!"

Those are lyrics from one of the best loved Hanukkah songs. Every other year the holiday coincides with Christmas, but not this year! By the time you read this article, the Jewish "festival of lights" will be here. Yes, it's time for lights and latkes.

When I was a child in Baltimore I delighted in creating my own personalized color scheme for the candles each night. I took this task quite seriously, never allowing two of the same colors next to each other.

Besides the candles, there are three things you need for a happy Hanukkah: latkes, latkes and latkes! Technically, they are fried potato pancakes. Everybody loves latkes.

To me the secret to making great latkes is to make them ahead. Some cooks swear you have to make latkes from scratch, peeling and grating potatoes. This is probably the best way to go, and if you have a food processor, it can speed things up. However, for lazy latke lovers like me, you can "doctor up" the store-bought mixes by adding one small grated potato for each box. If you are making many boxes for a crowd, you can be daring. Try adding in different finely shredded or grated ingredients, such as sweet potatoes, apples, zucchini, carrots or parsnips.

Next comes the frying—proceed with caution. Ask for help if you need it. No burned fingers or latkes, please! To make the latkes ahead, fry each latke until it is 90 percent

cooked through — no more. Place the "almost done" latkes in a shallow pan in one layer. You can also place them in the pan vertically, like a deck of cards — you will be able to fit quite a few in a pan in this position (again, one layer). Cover tightly. Refrigerate or freeze, depending on how long in advance you are preparing them. Reheat, uncovered, at about 350 degrees, for 15 to 20 minutes, or until heated through.

There is another way to go: Buy the frozen latkes from the grocery. (I won't tell.) And here's a unique twist: Set out a "latke bar" with a variety of toppings. There is much more than applesauce and sour cream to enhance latkes. Try cinnamon drops (from the 99-Cent Store) and mix them in with the applesauce, turning it pink and yummy. Put out an array of choices: sour cream and fresh chives; a variety of finely grated cheeses; fruit-flavored salsas; plain and flavored hummus; chutneys; guacamole. Let your imagination go!

With low interest rates, refinancing might be option

For those homeowners who have a mortgage on your home, interest rates are the lowest since Dwight Eisenhower was president. That's approximately 50 years ago. Now may be a perfect time to refinance the mortgage rate and/or length of the mortgage.

As a rule, a rate reduction of 1 percent to 1.25 percent or greater will be of significant benefit to the homeowner in reducing their monthly

payment.

Example A: \$250,000 30-year fixed rate at 6 percent equals a \$1,498.87 payment.

Example B: \$250,000 30-year fixed rate at 4 percent (today's approximate rate) equals a \$1,193.54 payment.

Take a look at your original loan paperwork or call your bank to find out your current interest rate and ask if you have a pre-payment penalty. It may be very worthwhile and save you a considerable amount of money to refinance.

Another thought, considering today's very low CD rates, is to apply the money to lowering the principle balance on your existing loan, thereby reducing the amount of interest you will pay.

The class is salsa, mambo, cha-cha and other Latin dance moves. Move and stretch to easy-to-learn choreography with safe and slow progressions.







was an interesting time for women in the service.

Several years after the war and after telling her stories to her family, she was told by her son that she should write a book about her adventures while in the service. And she did! It is titled, "Mother Was A Gunner's Mate" and was published in 2000. One of the reviews that I read commented about the skill and warmth she uses as she recalls her basic training at Hunter College in the Bronx and gunnery school at the Great Lakes Naval Station. She opens the door on a little-known branch of the Navy, the Armed Guard. Her story reflects the role of a woman in a man's role in the service. Indeed, when I read her book, I was in full agreement.

After the war Josette attended the University of Chicago, graduating in 1949 with a degree in philosophy. While attending school she worked with the renowned Dr. Bruno Bettleman, who ran a school for disturbed children.

It was at the university that she met and married Lowdon Wingo. After graduation she and Lowden moved to El Paso, Texas, where he was a city planner for seven years. They had two sons named Anthony and Laird.

Then it was on to Harvard, where her husband continued his education. During this time Josette worked in the Boston Settlement House.

Next stop was Washington, D.C., for 16 years, where Lowdon worked at the Resources for the Future Program with the Ford Foundation and Josette was teaching at an experimental charter school, which was very interesting. These were the days of New Math and other pilot programs with the Harvard School of Education.

Then it was on to California in 1977 where Lowdon taught at USC and was head of the Department of Regional Economics. Josette spent this time doing all manner of volunteering and working with Veterans Affairs, and that work continues to this day.

Economic planning and possible savings have always remained in sight, but no one wants to propose anything that would be done "on the cheap" or compromise quality for savings.

The underlying goal here is to be certain that the Village facilities remain well maintained and up to effective standards and that they remain as effective as other parts of the Village; to provide both recreational opportunities and social meeting places for all of us and to maintain our property values.


The room and tables all featured traditional Thanksgiving decorations.


