

At the Sept. 2 meeting of the Board of Directors, action was taken by telephone for bids for workers compensation insurance. Tolman & Wiker advised that the budgeted amount was \$80,248 and could go up. On motion, the Board approved the bid from Travelers Insurance of \$126,666.

The sellers can reserve their tables for \$5 starting on Oct. 7 at 8:15 a.m. in the Recreation Office. On the day of the sale,


everyone will be treated

WHAT'S COOKIN' IN THE VILLAGE Heart-healthy quiche is a delight

Last month I was invited to a brunch, and the hostess served up a luscious vegetable quiche, full of heavy cream and Swiss cheese. It was divine, but since my husband and I now strive to eat "heart healthy" food, I decided to adapt the rich recipe so we could enjoy it again.

One of our LV neighbors left some yummy homegrown tomatoes on her fence for passers-by. Thank you to our anonymous donor, as sliced tomato on the side made this a complete meal.

Feel free to make changes to your taste. You can use broccoli instead of spinach, or Swiss instead of cheddar. If you have a

bag of fresh spinach on hand, simply spray a pan and saute the spinach for a few minutes. Drain and use fresh sautéed spinach for an even better taste!

Susan's Light Quiche

1 tsp. olive oil

- 1/2 cup chopped red onion
- 1¹/₄ cup part-skim milk
- ricotta cheese 1 cup lowfat shredded
- cheddar cheese 1 large egg
- 2 large egg whites
- 1 Tbsp. Dijon mustard
- 1 tsp. dried oregano
- ¹/₄ tsp each of salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 10-oz chopped spinach, thawed and welldrained
- 2 tbsp. grated Parmesan cheese

Instructions:


• Preheat oven to 375. Spray bottom of 9-inch pie pan with spray oil.

• Heat oil in small skillet over medium heat. Add onion and saute until soft, about 3 minutes. Put onion in large bowl. Add ricotta cheese, cheddar, egg, egg whites, oregano, mustard, salt and pepper. Mix well. Spread into pie plate. Top with Parmesan.

• Bake about 35-40 minutes till golden brown. Let stand 10 minutes.

You can make this ahead, refrigerate and reheat. Freeze leftovers for a quick lunch. I reheat slices in the toaster oven at 350 for about 10 minutes.

Why are oleanders dying?

Nearly everyone who resides in Southern California can identify oleander shrubs, which have a rugged ability to survive in drought and intense summer heat.

The oleander displays beautiful clusters of blossoms in white, yellow, pink or red. These shrubs can grow as tall as 20 feet, but those used as screening have been pruned. which makes them more compact and attractive and can provide a handsome background for those who are close to school vards and various agricultural projects.

In Southern California, approximately 10 years ago, some oleanders developed a condition on their leaves that resembled the effects of scorching. At first only a few twigs and leaves were affected, but within one or two years, many of the shrubs were dead. The California agricultural community became concerned and started looking for a solution to save the oleanders. Millions of research dollars have failed to find a remedy that will allow the oleanders' survival.

There are three players involved in the collapse of the oleander: the sap of the oleander, a source of bacteria (xyl-

lela fastidiosa), and the insect deliverer (a glassywinged sharpshooter). The sharpshooter is equipped to pierce the oleander stem to obtain some of the water and nutrients. Unfortunately, the sharpshooter carries the deadly bacteria. A few of these bacteria remain in the oleander and soon multiply by the millions, clogging the transportation of vital nutrients that cause the oleander to die.

Leisure Village's oleander population has been savagely attacked by this disease. Some botanists believe the shrub will join the American Elm and the chestnut tree, which have become extinct over the past 200 years.

Steps are underway to replace our oleanders. In the Village 3 area, more than 880 feet of diseased shrubs were removed and replaced by five different species of plants - West Ringia, Nandina, Viburnum, Iceberg Rose and Phormium. Another project covering more than 1,000 feet will include Villages 42 and 44. The task is huge and will occur over an extended time frame.

The fate of the red oleander is unknown, but so far it seems to be resisting the fate of the other three colors.

With him on the panel, which included Jerry Cohen, Jerry Spector and David Haleman, was Pauline Davis, who, after his beloved wife "Lil," was Milt's biggest and most loyal fan, and who, by the way, also created the series (see attached photo).

I am one of the many Villagers who look back happily on having had a chance to play straight man for Milt. He gave us all a chance to appreciate
