Larry fights tooth and nail to keep a low profile and deflect any credit for himself, but his cause deserves all the attention possible. It is helping the vast Please see VETS on 11







Jim Ronge carved the best overall pumpkin with an interesting carving






keep in mind that we should all work to continue the program Larry set in motion.

The ophthalmologists considered the idea shortsighted.




