For the past four years I have had the opportunity to serve on the Board of Directors for Leisure Village Association in the capacity of director at large, a short time as treasurer, and for the past two years in the position of president.

Although faced with challenges at times, the recent experience has been one of the most uplifting and rewarding ever experienced in my entire life.

John Mayer was newly elected to the Leisure Village Board of Directors and Lin Grant was re-elected on June 24. Chuck Donnell, chief election inspector, announced a quorum with 1,506 votes cast, a turnout of more than 70 percent.

The results were announced with the following tally: Lin Grant, 879 votes; John Mayer, 793; Melinda Wells, 447; and Robert Kulick, 118. Six votes were cast for write-in candidate Al Fox.

A proposal on the ballot to move excess funds forward to next year passed 1,034 to 15.

A Working Board Meeting to elect officers followed, with Jerry Rosen being elected president; Lin Grant, vice president; Ted Lansing, treasurer; Don Marquardt, secretary; and John Mayer, director-at-large.

# A journey from terror to triumph



The young man weighed 60 pounds when he was rescued by American troops on their way to liberate the dreaded Nazi concentration camp at Dachau. His six-year Holocaust nightmare was about to end.

Twenty-five-year old Charles Pierce, then Charles Piasecki, had survived six German and Polish extermination camps, grueling 12-hour work days with only potato peels, grass and tiny pieces of bread for sustenance, frequent torture by Nazi guards, and the devastating news that his parents, two brothers, and other family had been killed.

"On the day I was rescued, my life changed completely," recalls Pierce, who lives with his wife Libby in Village 44. "I went from being dead to the opposite, thanks to the U.S. soldiers of the 20th Army Division."

But for more than 50 years, he would not talk about his Holocaust experiences - not to his wife, his three children, and certainly not to an audience. Libby says, "Our Please see BOARD on 10 kids didn't know the details

of his life for years." Then in 2005, their granddaughter asked him to talk to her history class at Camarillo High School. Charles Pierce decided it was time.

He dictated his story to his wife, who read it to the teens; then Charles answered questions.


"It wasn't - and still isn't - easy. The horror never goes away. But I think I survived the Holocaust so I could tell others about it," he explains. "I know I must continue. Books can't tell how it happened and what it was in the way I can."

His personal journey away from that hell began with a search - that was successful for his two surviving brothers. Charles eventually came to the U.S. in 1949, sponsored by an aunt who lived in Brooklyn. He was 29 years old, penniless and spoke no English. But he worked during the day, went to school at night and eventually attended Brooklyn Tech. He met Libby on a blind date and proposed three weeks later.

going to dinner with, and who had called him that day. You may not realize how important that was to him, but we do, and from all three of us, thank you so much.





This group of radio amateurs ("Hams") provides emergency communications for activities that require them in any type of emergency. Amateur radio operators can get messages in and/or out of the county when every other type of communication method in not operating, from telephones to satellites.

The ACS organization has taken it upon itself to develop a portable radio communications center for deployment anywhere in Ventura where a permanent station has been put out of service due to a

catastrophe. Deployment will occur quickly by a "Rapid Response Team" of Hams already organized and in place.

I am pleased and proud to report that this effort, impossible to fund by the Sheriff's Office in these hard times, received its first funding contributions of \$500 each from two Leisure Village clubs. The Leisure Village Women's Club and the Players Guild each came forward to support

this worthy project, which may benefit any part of Ventura County, if not all of it, at any time.

These funds allowed ACS to place a major part of the necessary equipment on order while waiting for additional contributions to materialize. At this writing, almost all necessary funds have been received, and the project is going ahead full speed.

#### Emergency training class offered

The Emergency Preparedness Organization (EPO) is sponsoring another Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training class here in Leisure Village this fall.

Our first class had 24 CERT graduates.

The program, sanctioned by Homeland Security and supported by the City of Camarillo, is made possible through the Ventura County Fire Department's professionals, who have expertise in emergency management.

Standardized classes that teach citizens about disaster preparedness for hazards that may occur in their area are taught throughout the United States.

As a CERT graduate, you will be knowledgeable in basic emergency response skills and able to immediately assist yourself and your neighbors, and in locations away from home following a disaster, when professional responders may not be available.

CERT's motto is: "Doing the greatest good for the greatest number of victims in the shortest amount of time.'

The free CERT course is presented over seven weeks (2.5 hours one evening a week) ending with a disaster simulation exercise.

The class starting date is still open and depends on how much interest we can generate to make it possible for instructors to be assigned to Leisure Village.

They have spoken at dozens of schools and civic groups.

"The youngest class was fourth grade, and they asked really good questions," recalls Charles, who is 89. In April, they were honored at Naval Base Ventura County on Holocaust Remembrance Day.


"Dad thanked the people in uniform for saving his life 65 years ago," says his son, Mark Pierce, who attended with his parents. He adds with pride that he and his siblings grew up in a home without hate or prejudice.

With Mark's help, Charles has a website, www. TheSurvivalStation.com. And he's written a book, "The Art of Survival," which recounts his Holocaust experiences – from the darkest days to those of peace and happiness. It is available online now.

With a gentle smile, Charles Pierce says, "It's still hard to talk about it. I still choke up. But it's very important that I continue, so it should never happen again."

# Strolling the streets of L.A.

Here are some explanations of the naming of famous Los Angeles

Alvarado Street was originally named after Juan Bautista, who became the first governor to promote public education.

Broadway had several sections, one of which was named Fort Street because it passed through Fort Moore. Another section was called Eternity Street, as it led to a cemetery. Another was BuenaView, meaning good view. Rumor has it that it was so named because of the view from the hillside of the women's bathing pools.

City officials finally decided to rename Fort Street because the area's many German inhabitants had trouble with the pronunciation and it came out Fourth Street, confusing it with the thoroughfare already named Fourth Street.

In 1910 all sections were named Broadway.

Figueroa Street was originally named Pearl Street.

From 1834 to 1845, Gov. Jose Figueroa, who was part Aztec Indian, directed the beginning of secularization of the territory, which had been under the control of the missions. After the padres lost their power, California experienced its first real land boom when 8 million acres were acquired by fewer than 800 men, who created 500 ranches.

In 1910 Horace Henderson Wilcox bought 120 acres in the foothills northwest of Los Angeles and

called the area Hollywood. Several years later a group of businessmen developed a housing tract named Hollywoodland and advertised it with a huge sign on the hillside. The "land" on the sign was later dropped.

Wilcox Avenue, another street in Hollywood, is named for the community's founder.

La Brea Avenue is named for the Spanish word for tar. It was named in 1869 when tar was discovered in pits and used for waterproofing the sod roofs of the adobe houses. The street was part of the 4,449-acre Rancho La Brea, which was purchased in 1860 for \$2.50 an acre.


Los Feliz Boulevard was named after Cpl. Jose Vicente Feliz, who led the first non-Indian expedition to what became the first pueblo of Los Angeles. Most of his land was the Silver Lake area and the higher slopes of Griffith Park. Rancho Los Veliz sold in the 1850s for \$1.00 an acre.

Now we come to Olvera Street, one of the oldest streets in Los Angeles. It was named in honor of Agustin Olvera, one of the commissioners who signed the Treaty of Cahuenga. Olvera was the first judge of the County of Los Angeles and later was a county supervisor.

Olympic Boulevard was named in honor of the upcoming 1932 Olympics.





Also, without the support of the Leisure Village management and staff, and the Education & Recreation Committee, this event could not have taken place.






