Candidate's Night is May 24 in AR

The major decisions governing the residents of Leisure Village are made by a five-member board of directors, two of whom will be elected this year at the annual meeting scheduled for Thursday, June 28.

As part of the annual election process, qualified candidates will be invited to attend a function on May 24 at 7 p.m. in the Assembly Room known as Candidate's Night, one of the most important events of the year. At that time, homeowners may ask nominees questions of their choosing, thereby giving homeowners an opportunity to make informed decisions prior to casting their vote.

For those new to the community and as a gentle reminder for tenured homeowners, a brief summary of the process may be described as follows:

• Persons wanting to be placed on the ballot needed to either have been approved by the Nominating Committee by April 2 or submitted a petition containing 43 signatures of homeowners by the deadline date of April 29.

• The official announcement of qualified

candidates will be made at the open board meeting on Monday, May 7.

• Candidate portfolios, including pictures, will be placed in the atrium on May 8.

• Candidates Night will be conducted on May 24.

• Absentee ballots will be mailed to homeowners on May 25.

• Determination of the winners by counting the votes will be concluded at the annual meeting on June 28.

Although nominations may be made from the floor at the annual meeting as required by law, it is important to note that a vast majority of the voting in our community occurs via the absentee ballot process, and although the individual votes are not actually counted until June 28, if you have been waiting to throw your hat into the ring, you've probably waited too long.

The new board will elect officers at their first meeting scheduled for Monday, July 2.

It is a very simple but extremely important process, so be sure to know the candidates and cast your vote.



Edison prepares to modernize

If you were curious about those engineering crews working in the Village for a couple of weeks last month, they were part of the early planning stages of a multibillion-dollar modernization of Southern California Edison's entire electricity infrastructure throughout the area.

The small square holes, marked and numbered in orange paint, pinpointed the locations of so-called "monument markers," metal discs embedded below the paving. Those markers, which are metal, provide magnetic bases for the engineering crews to measure every Village street. The result of their measurements will be precise, up-to-date maps that Edison will use for future installations or repairs of the utility's equipment.

Transplant survivor issues plea: Join organ donor registry

She was living in San Diego to be closer to the hospital. He stayed in Camarillo near work at Rocketdyne.

"I kept a bag of clothes ready just for that call. When Shirley phoned, I grabbed the bag and ran out to the car where I realized I was buck-naked," he recalls.

He made it to San Diego in two and a half hours — after he threw on some clothes.

Shirley was giddy when she and her daughter got to the hospital.

"I knew I was going to make it," she remembers. "I danced into the E.R. with my oxygen tank and heart pump hanging off my chest."

Three months later, Roy and Shirley returned to Camarillo. She was strong, taking 25 pills a day to prevent her body from rejecting the new lung, and able to live a nearnormal life.

But that's not what Shirley wants to talk about. She wants to tell as many people as she can, particularly

Facts about organ, tissue donation

Who: Anyone of any age can become a donor; age is not a limitation. The physical and medical condition of the donor will determine what organs and tissue can be donated.

What: Organs for transplantation include kidneys, heart, lungs, liver, pancreas and small bowel. Tissues include eyes, heart valves, bone, skin, veins and tendon. A single donor can save many lives.

Success: High survival rates follow transplants, with success for kidney transplants ranging between 90 and 95 percent. Many recipients live for 10 to 20 years or more.

How: Donors can enroll online at www.organdonor.gov or register at a local DMV office, or get a form at a public library. Registered donors should also tell family or friends of their wishes.

Cost: The donor's family or estate does not pay anything for organ donation. All costs are paid by the recovery program.

When: Donation is only an option after all life-saving measures have failed, and death is declared. The quality of care does not change; the medical teams involved in saving a life is different from the team called for organ recovery. Donation surgery will not disfigure the body.

neighbors throughout the Village, that everyone — including seniors — can be and should be registered organ and tissue donors. Age is not a consideration.

"I want people to know that we can donate at any age and any medical condition. Don't rule yourself out!" she insists.

Her donor has given Shirley more than a decade — and counting — of good health, the opportunities to RV through 34 states with Roy, to play regularly with her 7-year-old granddaughters, to write two books about her experience as a transplant recipient, and to promote the need for more registered organ donors.

"If your driver's license or ID card has a pink dot on it, you are registered," she explains.

Or contact the DMV by phone (800-777-0133) or online (www. organdonor.gov) to find out if your name is on the registration list.

People often ask Shirley Jewett how the transplant has changed her life. Without it, she would "be under the grass," she says. "I had no choice, but my donor's family did. They saved me. I can't thank them enough for saying 'yes' to organ donation."

Now Shirley wants us to say "yes" too, by joining the organ donor registry.

Ever wonder how sayings came to be?




