Homeowners choose 3 new Board members

The Leisure Village Board of Directors has two new faces and three familiar ones as a result of the annual election held on June 27.

Bob Riveles, Lin Grant and Rita Linsey were the top three vote-getters from a ballot of eight candidates. Riveles and Linsey are newcomers to the Board; Lin Grant previously served four years. They join Ted Lansing and John Mayer, who each have one year remaining in their terms.

The official count came from 1,159 ballots, 88 more than the quorum required by Village rules, said Chuck Donnel, chief election inspector.

Three vacancies were to be filled because Don Marquardt

and Jerry Rosen were termed out, and Bob Ellis chose not to run again.

In the early morning hours of June 6, 1944, future Villager Bigg Al Schuster prepared to be part of what General Ike Eisenhower labeled as the Great Crusade: the massive undertaking to free Europe from Nazi control. The first part of that operation was the Normandy invasion, the largest seaborne invasion the world had ever experienced. Schuster was to go on and fight as part of Operation Market Garden (of "A Bridge Too Far" fame) and Bastogne (Battle of the Bulge) before

It was easy to follow the positive example of Bob McOuivey as I became your president. Bob deserves all of our thanks for putting our house in order.


I could and probably should thank

CERT graduates to meet July 9

Graduates of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program at Leisure Village are invited to a reorganizational meeting Tuesday, July 9, at 7 p.m. in the MPR. CERT's role in Leisure Village emergencies, refresher workshops and future trainings are on the agenda.

Should the Village have a dog park?

Should the Village have a dog park?

It's a question that has aroused a wide variety of energetic responses, from "Absolutely" to "Absolutely Not." And that's why the members of the Pet Club are focused on taking down the rhetoric and creating a reasonable discussion.

Pet Club President Mary Ann Robnett explains why.

"Our mission statement says that the club will promote responsible pet ownership. We believe we need a discussion open to all residents to examine the pros and cons," she says.

The issue came up at the very first meeting of the Pet Club nearly three years ago. Now 70 members strong, the group took a close look at a proposal for an off-leash, fenced pet area for dogs a few months ago.

"We talked to the general manager. We did a phone survey of nearly 40 percent of the Village. We scoped out a proposed area," recalls Mary Ann.

The results were interesting; the club's response was cautious.

General Manager Bob Scheaffer "raised some important factors to us," says Mary Ann. "For example, he said having space for parking was as important as space for the dogs."


Club members had suggested an area near the Annex. When the homeowners closest to it were polled, they all objected.

The phone survey by the Pet Club rang up 509 homes in 14 Villages. Results approximated that nearly 350 dogs live here (24 percent of households, averaging nine per village). Some 77 percent of pet owners said they would use a pet activity area here because it promotes healthy pets by providing a safe area for exercise and socialization.

But the club will not go forward alone.

"We want a general forum, not just our members. Something like LV's Master Plan Committee would be a perfect place for this issue," says Mary Ann.

She reminds us that pet owner responsibility is the centerpiece of the club. Look at the current PUP campaign: posters and signs reminding owners to Pick Up Poop. That's an issue we all agree on.



Camera Club tours library

The college students are gone for the summer, but the architecturally unique John Spoor Broome Library at the center of the campus of California State University Channel Islands is open for public tours.

The Leisure Village Camera Club enjoyed a docent tour on June 7 and took advantage of many photo opportunities, including the reflection pool and the 193 flags of the United Nations.

Docent Mitch Okui was very informative about the architectural details and history of the library.

The imposing John Spoor Broome Library, completed in 2008, offers an inside look at the work of one of the world's most highly acclaimed architects, Lord Norman Foster. The 137,000-square-foot structure combines glass, steel and concrete into a fascinating repository for books, archives, technology and unusual displays, as the LV Camera Club discovered during its tour.

The university's Summer Architectural Tours showcase the library as well as other works by Lord Foster, who has won nearly every major architectural award, including the Pritzker Prize. His portfolio contains such designs as the Millennium Bridge in London, the Reichstag in Berlin, the Hong Kong Airport and the Hearst Tower in New York.

Foster was an early proponent of sustainability, and the Broome Library is a good example of his emphasis on natural light and venting plus the use of building materials like concrete. More than 40,000 square feet of glass was used in the construction, which cost \$56 million.

their dual objectives to "listen" and keep Leisure Village on its current positive track. As people crowded around with congratulations, Lin Grant said, "I want to keep the Village running exactly as it has.'

And Rita Linsey echoed that when asked if she planned to suggest any major changes.

"No," she said emphatically, adding, "I want to bring back the ad hoc Master Plan Committee that we had several years ago to evaluate what we'll need in the future."

Bob Riveles said he will begin his tenure by learning the inner workings of some of the new responsibilities he's not familiar with.

"I am ready to listen to other points of view," he said.

"Board members should be objective."


The first order of business for the new Board was selection of its officers. By unanimous vote. Lin Grant was chosen president and Bob Riveles, vice president. John Mayer continues as secretary, Ted Lansing as treasurer and Rita Linsey as director at large.

Incumbent John Mayer congratulated all candidates on their hard work during the campaign. He said that the election made him aware of voices he hadn't heard before. He pledged the Board would "have our ears open to discover new ways to do things."

The first Open Board meeting of the new term will be held on Monday, July 1, at 10 a.m. in the AR.

Forum tackles proposed project

Proponents and opponents of the proposal to convert 740 acres of farmland on the south side of the Conejo Grade into a residential, commercial and recreational development faced off at a Leisure Village forum on June 17.

The Conejo Creek Specific Plan was first proposed to the City of Camarillo in 2007 and has been slowly working its way through state and local reviews ever since. The plan calls for 2,500 housing units, 1.3 million square feet of business and industrial area, and 240 acres of open and recreational space.

The Camarillo City Council will make the final decision on this land use.

The development plan has met opposition, mostly from citizen groups who argue that to turn the verdant open space visible from the top of the 101 Freeway into housing and commercial buildings will increase traffic congestion, eliminate productive agricultural space, change the aesthetics and reduce the number of tourists drawn to the green vistas of Camarillo.

Because the project could have an impact on Leisure Village, the Ed and Rec Committee agreed to host a forum on the issue. More than 200 LV residents attended the presentation, which was first suggested by Villager Marge Lorraine.

"We moved here from the San Fernando Valley. I know that growth occurs wherever communities exist," she says. "But it should be measured and deliberate. I wanted residents to hear both sides of this issue."

Dennis Hardgrave represented the developers, five farm families who joined together to convert their land into the Conejo Creek project. He emphasized that a proposed flood bypass channel included in the plans could remove Leisure Village homes from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) flood zone. He said the trails and parks would be available for public use. Because of the complexity of the project, Hargrave estimated it could be several years before construction would begin.

Representing the opposition to the Conejo Creek Plan were Louise Roberts and Merrill Buerge, both Camarillo homeowners who lead groups opposed to the project. They listed the "significant and unavoidable impacts" identified in the draft environmental impact report (DEIR), including an estimated 41,000 additional car trips daily on the freeway, plus 4,000 more on Santa Rosa Road.

LV residents asked more than a dozen questions about traffic impact, if the city needs 2,500 more homes, and how Leisure Village could benefit from the bypass channel.

A video of the forum will be presented on LVTV in July.

The next official step — when the city Planning Commission makes a decision on the DEIR — is expected in the next few months at a public meeting in City Hall.



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

Meat marinade economical

As you walk through Leisure Village in the evening, do you detect delicious scents of barbecue? Nothing beats meat on the grill!

I love flank steak, but it can be pricey. My new favorite is London Broil, a great buy. If it's over two pounds, I cut it in half and put one in the freezer. One pound is perfect for me and my husband.

To make it tender. I "stab" both sides repeatedly with a fork. Next I add my marinade. I never buy bottled anymore. This Magical Meat Marinade is fabulous and economical. You can cook the meat inside in the broiler, too. This marinade is magic!

Ingredients 1/2 cup olive oil 1/3 cup soy sauce

1/3 cup fresh lemon juice ¹/₄ cup Worcestershire sauce 1 tablespoon garlie powder 3 tablespoons dried basil* 1 tablespoon dried parsley * 1 teaspoon black pepper*

*Use whatever dried herbs you have on hand. To give it a "kick," you can even add a dash of Tabasco.

Directions

Be sure you have pricked the meat with a fork to allow the marinade to soak in. You can whisk all the ingredients or put them in a blender and mix for 30 seconds. Pour over the meat. Cover and refrigerate for 8 hours or overnight.

Cook meat however you like. Slice thinly on diagonal.

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Realtors Corner: Insurance important

Most of us know that there have been two recent fires in Leisure Village, one in Village 6 and another in Village 29. Because of this, I am again writing about the importance of having appropriate insurance on our homes.

Policies and coverage can be confusing! Our Leisure Village Association has a master policy which covers the perimeter, structural walls and roof. It is sometimes referred to as a "bare bones policy." If a homeowner has a fire in their unit and has to make a claim, there could be a \$5,000 deductible assessed to the homeowner.

Not covered in the master policy are cabinets, vanities, countertops, sinks, toilets, stove, dishwasher, refrigerator, washer, dryer, garbage disposal, water heater, flooring, lighting, bathroom fixtures, shower, tub, etc.

Personal property contents in one's home is not covered at all on the master policy, but is included on your HO6 policy, commonly known as a condo-owner policy. There are sub-limits for jewelry and other target items, so you may want to add a floater (endorsement) to insure those specific items, and that requires a recent appraisal. Be sure to include "Contents Replacement Cost" to your policy so that your insurance will pay you "new for old" on your contents should you have a loss.

When talking with your insurance agent, you may want to ask about earthquake and flood insurance, if relevant, for your home.

Please be sure to have the correct coverage. Once a loss occurs, it is too late!

In the AR, the Lapidary participants allowed visitors to make jewelry while enjoying cookies and





D-Day remembered by Villager

going into Austria to liberate Berchtesgaden at war's end. This is the conclusion of Bigg Al's D-Day experience.

"The 101st, joined by the 82nd and some Brits and (free) Poles, were going in before the actual invasion," Schuster remembers. "Our job was to secure critical locations, destroy bridges that the Germans could use to move reinforcements, and to take the town of Carentan.

"Within the 501st, the 1st and 2nd battalions were on point. Our battalion (the 3d battalion) was in reserve. That meant we were to drop into the area, form up and wait to be assigned to wherever help was needed.

"The night of June 5, we moved to our airfields. The 3rd battalion flew out of Welford; the others left from Merryfield airport. We were all supposed to leave at 10:45 that night and drop into France about five hours before the actual invasion started at daybreak.

"Well, things didn't go exactly to plan. We got off a little late and the flack over the drop zones was really bad. A lot of the planes were hit before they got to the drop zone. Other pilots tried to zig zag to make themselves harder targets, but that only got them off course. Some actually turned back to England without dropping any of their parachutists or releasing their gliders. Boy, were those pilots in

trouble! Our pilot actually slowed down to make it easier for us to jump, but of course, that just made him a better target. Bottom line: We were scattered all over the place.

"We were supposed to drop north and east of Carentan, but I really don't know where we landed. As confused as things were for us, the Germans were even more confused. We were so scattered that they thought that many more units had dropped.

"As I said, Toby and I were on the same plane. I landed on a German soldier; to this day I don't know if he was already dead or if I knocked him out. I was scared. The adrenalin was really flowing. People were shooting at us! My buddy Toby was hung up on a roof steeple. We were trained to cut ourselves out of the harness should that happen-or better yet, to steer the chute so that we landed in an open area. But there was Toby, hung high and dry — and a perfect target for the Germans who were all around us. Before I could get to him, one of our officers and a sergeant got to him and cut him down.

"We were loaded down with equipment. Besides my M-1 and bayonet, I had a full band of ammunition (40 rounds) and four grenades. We also carried a few days worth of K-rations. Among other things we had was a clicker — just like in the TV series. We were supposed to use it to identify ourselves in the dark. Like a dumb kid, I put mine in the bottom of my (very deep) pocket, where I couldn't find it after we dropped. Shortly after we landed, I was challenged by one of our guys. I couldn't find the clicker and I panicked. 'Hey it's me, Al' I called out. Again, the response was only a single click. I thought I'd had it. I called out again and after a few seconds, Sgt. Reggie Owens appeared out of the dark telling me that I'd damn near got shot. I found my clicker."

The members of both airborne divisions were now scattered across the Carentan peninsula. Many units were forming up as troops gathered around whatever officers and noncoms they found. Many did not know exactly where they were and, equally important, where their objectives were. The French resistance came to their rescue, showing their locations and objectives on the maps.

"They did something else for us," Schuster recalled, "they broadcast to the Germans that 'Roosevelt's killers' had come. That scared a lot of the inexperienced Germans in the area. Every little edge helps in combat.

"Confusion or not, we took our objectives, including the town of Carentan, and held them until we were relieved by the 83rd Infantry on June 27. However, they didn't send us back to England. On the 29th, we were sent to Cherbourg to relieve the 4th Infantry Division. But that was OK, because Cherbourg was to be our R & R location. It had beautiful beaches and everything else a tired soldier could want."

plays and musicals, to the "Neat Tricks Computer Class" that Bill created and taught for 11 years, this couple has been active and involved in countless ways since they moved here in 1997.

Annie and Bill would be quick to say that lots of other residents have been equally active. But what makes them unique is that Annie has been nearly blind since childhood, and Bill was the victim of a serious stroke two years ago.

"Everything is so easy here," explains Annie. "And that's what we liked when we chose Leisure Village."

Bill is a retired aerospace engineer who was a member of the Space Shuttle Orbiter Design Team. When he arrived in Camarillo. he brought that technological enthusiasm with him.

The very first LV website (www.

leisurevillage.us) was his creation. His "Neat Tricks" class - two two-hour groups every Monday - brought computing to hundreds of Villagers before being a computer geek was fashionable. Bill joined the Camera Club well before digital photos were universal, and each month, he helped members prepare their photos for competition. And he was the first to automate the Village's emergency response system.

The stroke slowed him down. But his technology skills still get a workout.

Annie says Leisure Village continues to be a good fit for them.

"It's ideal for walking, swimming, and I love performing with the Players Guild," she says. Musicals, comedy, skits, she's there and ready.

"I memorize my lines with Bill. He reads the script to me over and over again. And I keep repeating lines until I've got it." A Players Guild colleague adds

that the audience generally has no idea Annie is blind.

She began to lose vision in grade school, the result of scarring on the optic nerve. She learned medical transcription skills as a young widow with three children to support and had a successful career from then on.

"She was a cracker jack typist; she could do 90 words a minute," Bill reports proudly.

Now Annie is computer savvy, using a device created by her husband that combines voice and font magnification.

The Robinsons would sav they moved from Paradise to Paradise 16 years ago. They mean they left Paradise, Calif., for Leisure Village.

"People are so friendly; there are so many activities. I'm much more independent here than I would be in a normal house," Annie says, smiling about their most important "Neat Trick" of all.

Holding the bag

Here's an exercise for people over 50.


Begin by standing on a comfortable surface, where you have plenty of room at each side.
