Villager focuses her life on helping, advising, healing

Villager Mary Jane Porter was walking near the Rec Center recently when a woman approached her.

"I want you to know that if it weren't for the Health Fair, I would not have known I had a cancer in my eye until it was too late," she said. "Thank you for all you do."

Mary Jane smiles as she remembers the moment. Even though she retired from nursing more than a decade ago, she's up to her elbows in creating and leading programs that help, advise and sometimes even heal Leisure Village residents.

As longtime president of

Your Neighbors Care group, she reinvigorated the annual LV Health Fair, which last year featured 46 different health vendors and practitioners visited by more than 500 people.

"Nine years ago, there were only 12 booths. Now health providers begin calling us months ahead to get a spot in the Fair," she says proudly.

MJ (as many friends call her) moved here reluctantly in 2004 to be closer to her children (three sons, one daughter).

"We drove through the gate and I was sure I wouldn't like it," she remembers. But when a new friend suggested



Applying for home mortgage can be long, arduous process

All aspects of financial life are analyzed

Since the banking crisis, applying for a home mortgage has become very demanding. Lenders require more paperwork from all borrowers that document every facet of financial life: taxable income, assets, rent payments and more.

Typical loan guideline requirements specify one month of verified income, proven with paycheck stubs. Also required are one or two years of Form W-2s.

Borrowers generally must supply bank and investment account statements for the last 30 days. An application for a jumbo loan could trigger a request for up to three

months of statements. Today, almost everyone is expected to provide a recent tax return, including all the pages and schedules.

Borrowers must also sign IRS Form 4506T, which allows the lender to get a transcript of the tax return from the IRS. This practice has become an industry standard as fraud prevention.

Tax returns are scrutinized for unreimbursed employee business expenses, self-employment business losses and telltale signs of loan fraud, such as reported income that doesn't match an employee's W-2. Amending a prior year's tax returns to show more income is now a no-no!
