LV offers Ancestry.com for free

Have you ever considered documenting your family ancestry but thought that it would be too difficult or too expensive? Well, think again, because soon the resources of Ancestry.com will be available to you free of charge.

The Tech Center (formerly known as the Computer Club), headed by Kathy Wirtz, is purchasing an annual World Explorer membership via the Ancestry.com website. The Computer Club has a \$1,000 bequest from Winfred Singleton that is to be used only for genealogy research.

In the past, Winfred taught residents how to use Ancestry. com. With the new program, Pinky Palladino, who has been helping residents for several years, will be giving introductory instructions. In addition, Rita Linsey will be conducting orientations as needed.

All research must be done in the Tech Center: our World Explorer membership does not allow home use of the program. However, the Tech Center is equipped with 12 PCs and five Macs, all of which can be accessing the Ancestry.com website simultaneously. It should be noted that this program allows research only, not the compilation of a family tree. All data must be copied down on paper or typed into a Word document that you then email to yourself or remove using a USB drive. At the end of each day. all data is automatically deleted.

Final procedures are still being developed, but access to the Tech Center is restricted to residents who receive a key from the Rec Center Office. Those keys are not transferable and must not be duplicated or loaned to others.

Interested residents should sign up at the Rec Center Office.

Disaster Preparedness Corner

We have received many requests to explain "shelter in place."

Shelter in place is intended as a short-term strategy. It was originally used as an emergency procedure for people affected by a chemical accident or chemical attack. It entails taking immediate shelter in a readily accessible location, such as a small inner room, and sealing it from outside contaminants and shutting off all heating and air conditioning systems. Depending on the exact situation, everyone within a specific distance of the incident may be ordered to shelter in place.

The phrase has increasingly been used by the Red Cross and police to describe precautions to be taken by the public when dealing with a disaster. Public authorities may call for potential victims in a hazardous situation to shelter in place, particularly in the event of a release of hazardous materials such as radiological, biological or chemical

contaminants. Such releases, whether accidental or intentional, may put surrounding populations in danger. In light of active-shooter events, and the panic that can ensue, shelter in place is also being implemented by the police as a response to armed events. Earthquakes and the damage it has caused could also require the authorities to order a shelter in place.

"What are the first things I should do to get prepared for a disaster?" asks BFM of Village 23.

First, purchase and store your basic food and water supplies: non-perishable foods, canned goods, energy and nutrition bars; 1 gallon of water per day, per person, in the home enough for a week; nuts and dried fruits, etc.

Next, make a kit that has money, clothing, medicines, important papers, flashlight, battery-operated or crank – powered radio etc. Contact your Village Coordinator for a complete list.

Realtors Corner: Is reverse mortgage right for you?

A reverse mortgage is a special type of loan that allows a homeowner to convert a portion of the equity in their home into cash. It eliminates monthly mortgage payments without losing the title to the home. No repayment is required until the borrower(s) no longer live in the house as the principal residence. The loan is paid back when the senior moves out of the home, sells it, the last borrower on title passes away or when the borrower fails to meet the obligations of the loan.

In order to qualify for a reverse mortgage, seniors must be 62 or older and own a home with sufficient equity that they live in as their primary residence. If the homeowner has a mortgage, that's OK — it can be

paid off with the reverse mortgage proceeds. The senior must continue to pay required property taxes and homeowner insurance.

The amount that can be received depends on the homeowner's age, current interest rates and the lesser of the appraised value of the home, the sale price or the maximum lending limit. There are closing and other costs, most of which can be financed as part of the loan.

Once any existing mortgage is paid off, the net proceeds from a reverse mortgage can be used for any purpose, from making ends meet to living your retirement dreams.





Wii Bowlers compete at high level

For the very first time in LV Wii Bowling Club's two-year history, our four highest-scoring bowlers competed with 13 other teams of top-notch bowlers, all members or residents of senior centers and senior living facilities located in Ventura County. The fifth annual event was sponsored by SCAN Health Plans, the benefactor of Wii Bowling systems for numerous senior facilities, including Leisure Village.

The event began Thursday, Oct. 10, with a 9 a.m. check-in at the Pleasant Valley Senior Center. Each team member and two alternates were given bags filled with a T-shirt, snacks and other goodies. Several teams, including LV, invited spectators to cheer them on.

The exciting competition commenced at 10 a.m. and each of the 14 teams of four bowled one game.

LV's Sylvia Edmonds, team captain (257), Barbara Bell (180), William Lamar (240), and Darryl Sobelman (264), took second place in the morning

session with 941 total pins. Rei Sugita and Paul Schifanelli were alternates but did not bowl.

Simi Valley took first place with 1,093 pins. The top five teams of the morning also included South Oxnard Senior Center, Pleasant Valley Senior Center and Colonia Senior Center (after winning a one-frame bowl-off for fifth place with SCAN Senior Center).

After the lunch provided by SCAN, the five top teams of the morning competed to determine the two overall top teams that would compete in a final game for first place. Battling tough competition, the LV team came in fourth, with a total score of 865 pins. Barbara Bell had the highest team score for that game, with 258 pins.

Simi Valley won overall first place in the final game with an outstanding 1,128 total pins. A team member told the VC Star reporter: "The team's secret is simple, we practice three days a week, up to five hours a day." South Oxnard Senior Center came in second with an

admirable 954 pins. Trophies and many prizes were awarded.

Paul Schifanelli, president of our club, was also quoted in the Oct. 11 article in the VC Star Camarillo section: "A lot of people who love to go regular bowling can't do it anymore because it's physically impossible. Wii Bowling gives

them the opportunity to do it."

as well as the City of Camarillo. Dedicated and caring volunteers deliver "ready-to-heat" meals. The menu is intended to provide a diverse diet that meets recommended nutritional guidelines and is offered to Camarillo residents 60 and older.

Chief Executive Officer of the Camarillo Health Care District, Jane Rozinski, wants to ensure Leisure Village residents are aware that the Senior Nutrition Program is available. Requirements are that a client be age 60 or older and housebound due to illness or disability.

The program is comprised of volunteer drivers who pick up frozen meals at the Camarillo Airport and deliver them to their clients. One volunteer said that she is as glad to see her clients as they are to see her. Special bonds and relationships often develop.

The Senior Nutrition Program delivers meals on Monday, Wednesday and Friday by 11:30 a.m. A donation

of \$3 is requested for each meal, and the program also provides at no cost an additional meal for any caregiver at the same location. Some clients go on the program temporarily while they recuperate from a medical procedure; others use it as a permanent supplement for their nutritional needs.

On the second Thursday morning of each month, Food Share offers free produce to the entire community. The following day is when their clients also receive a bag of fresh fruit and vegetables with their delivered meal.

Ann Springer, senior director of Community Services said, "Isn't it wonderful how people have been helping people since the beginning of time. It is just in our nature to help one another."

In addition to nutrition, the program also assists in the safety and wellness of residents with scheduled visits to clients to assess their continued need for homedelivered meals, as well as their general welfare. "It is a group effort,"
Dick declares. The musical resurgence is happening thanks to the effort of lots of people, he's quick to say: Sam Arouesty, Roy Badger, Stan Vansant, Richard Weiss, to name a few.

"About three years ago, we decided we could bring more musical entertainment into the Village," Dick explains.

Sam Arouesty led the creation of a big band. He recruited musicians, gathered hundreds of music

arrangements, and now brings the 17-person Swing Band to rehearse weekly in the AR. It's all open to the public and entirely free.

"And the Musicians Club monthly sessions are casual get-togethers for players and listeners in an easy cabaretstyle with round tables (and wine)," Dick adds.

Typically, 50 or 60 Villagers make up the audience for the Band, Musicians Club performances and Sing-A-Long.

This is Dick Guttman's career-in-retirement. For 30 years, he was a lawyer — vice president and assistant general counsel for Square D Company in Chicago — with music always a part of his life. His piano lessons in the third grade led to playing for the lunch crowd at his Cleveland, Ohio, high school and on into adulthood.

"I used to sit down at the piano (a 1927 grand piano he still plays) when I came home from work, and the family could tell what my mood was by the music I played," he laughs.

He and his wife Sandy divided their time between


Illinois and Leisure Village until three years ago when they chose to go west full time. And that's when Dick began to grow music here.







Bob Cryder: The Model Man for Leisure Village

It began as an idea to build a golf cart. That's what Bob Cryder usually does; he makes things — all kinds of things — continuing a passion he developed as a child building models. The theoretical golf cart was eclipsed when Bob saw tantalizing plans online to create — from scratch — a replica of an early 20th century General Motors concept vehicle designed for small business deliveries. He was hooked.

Now, after one year and more than a thousand hours of work in his Leisure Village garage, plus shopping trips for everything from old metal springs to elegant china closet doors, the shiny black and red vehicle is ready to go!

Here comes a 1904 Oldsmobile Pie Wagon, Cryder-style.

The vehicle is vintage Cryder.

"I found frames, mounts and springs at salvage yards which I knew could be twisted and turned into the kind of body I wanted," says Bob.

He made several visits to a local blacksmith shop for help in welding metal into shapes he needed. He made the sides of the carriage out of recycled plastic and PVC, which makes it very weatherproof and light. The tires are actually motorcycle wheels; the windows are picture frames from Michael's.

"I was an electronic technician in research and development at Northrop," Bob recalls. "There we were given an idea to build into reality, and we always asked, 'What else can we do with this design?"

What Bob can do with his Pie Wagon is actually drive it! He made it electric, not gas (more economical, he explains) and it's fully registered with the DMV, complete with a license plate and insurance. When he and his wife Verna took the Pie Wagon to the Oxnard DMV office on a trailer, it caused quite a stir.

"They loved it," Verna says. "But they also made sure we had turn signals, windshield wipers and a VIN number before they would register the 'low speed vehicle,' as it's known in DMV lingo."

Verna laughs when she thinks about how much time Bob spent in

their one-car garage building the Pie Wagon.

"It doesn't faze me. You know that old saying about boys and their toys," she says with a smile. The Cryders are looking forward to taking their Pie Wagon to car shows; they have no plans to sell it. And he expects to drive it around the Village, too.

"We have something unique here," adds Bob.

It's a Cryder original.
