

MEET NORMAN AND DOROTHY DANIELS

VILLAGERS WHO ARE CONTINUING THEIR SUCCESSFUL CAREERS

Perhaps while strolling through the Village Library Lounge you've noticed the volumns of fictional books written by two prolific authors—Dorothy and Norman Daniels. Well, did you know that the Daniels are Leisure Village Residents, and that they are continuing to write their literary specialty—the Gothic novel? As a matter of fact, they are currently finishing their 189th manuscript.

"Gothics came into popularity about ten years ago," Mr. Daniels states, "they're mostly about a young girl, very innocent, who goes back to some gloomy old house and gets into some kind of mysterious trouble—she's threatened—and a fellow comes to her rescue. It's a love story along with a mystery. There's no sex involved—can't use a single cuss word—they're clean as a book can possibly be."

The Daniels' books have met great success from teen-agers and housewives. A school for "wayward girls" in North Carolina, Samarkand Manor, has just voted Dorothy as their favorite author. "They have all of our books and we have just received a letter from a School Official thanking us for our interest in the girls," Dorothy relates. In addition, a long-distance interview is being set-up between the Daniels and a group of post-graduate students at Bowling Green University in Ohio. These English Majors are interested in the Gothic novel.

With almost two-hundred novels under their belts, Dorothy and Norman have no fear of running out of material. "We do a great amount of research, a lot of reading, and we rely quite a bit on our imaginations" Norman explains. Part of Mr. Daniels' background has been earlier work in Police Court, an insurance investigator looking into fraudulent claims, and one year of Medical School. "It's all good background," Mrs. Daniels adds.

Besides Gothic novels, Norman Daniels did a great number of radio scripts, such as The Nick Carter Show, for many years and several television scripts, including Ben Casey. One of Norman Daniels novels, *Shadow of a Doubt* is currently being shot in France as a movie. "It's very controversial, they were afraid to do it in America," Dorothy injects. "It's about Capital Punishment, and since the death penalty has been abolished, the studios were afraid that someone might try to block it with a lawsuit.

Each of the Daniels' have a personal office in their home, so that they can totally immerse themselves in their work. "Being an author is a solitary life, you can't have people around," says Norman. Dorothy adds, "Writers are the loneliest people in the world. An artist has his model, a musician his instrument, but a writer has nothing but his cold typewriter."


We give credit to Al and Peg Jensen for the work they have done in planning and running the tournament. The match play idea seemed to go over well with the members.



PROJECT SUGAR BEET

"Sugar bowls of Leisure Village, arise"!

Who knows but that you'll be filled one of these days with sugar from beets grown right on Village property on land behind the tennis courts. This land has been leased by two ambitious and enterprising young gentlemen, Joe Drummond and Jim Wagner, sophomores at Camarillo High School.

In conjunction with agricultural studies at school and the F.F.A. (Future Farmers of America), this project applies their text book learning and has the sanction of the Department of Agriculture. Eight acres of beets have been planted, and the boys are assured a market for their crop as they have a contract with the Union Sugar Division of the Consolidated Foods Corporation to purchase the yield. With such inducement, Union Sugar aims to encourage young people to cultivate sugar beets and, in addition, create future growers of this crop.

Financed by the growers, this is no small undertaking, and they do much of the heavy work themselves to minimize expenses. After the initial plowing, the boys and their helpers broke up the ground by discing, followed by fertilization and more discing. Since there's living material in the soil which likes sugar beets equally as well as humans do, round-worms, known as Nematodes, had to be erradicated by sterilization of the ground. Round-worms may occur in such numbers that a spadeful of garden earth is likely to contain up to a million worms. By chemical means, their elimination was assured. This operation along with bedding and seeding was done by a commercial farming concern.

In the absence of rain, irrigation equipment was installed by the growers to promote germination which, under favorable conditions, occurs in from ten days to two weeks. Subsequent to thinning in about two months, weeding was done-both operations by hand. With proper moisture and sunshine, and many hours of care, a harvest of from 30 to 35 tons of beets per acre is anticipated in approximately nine months from planting time.

What is believed to be a world record (45.03 tons of beets averaging 8.06 tons of sugar per acre) was established in 1939 by D. Bianco and A. Sona of Gonzalez, California. Some farmers in this State produce as much as 5 tons of sugar per acre, but the average has been around 2.6 tons. The upper limits, of course, are hoped for by Drummond and Wagner, and it's the wish of all Leisure Villagers that their crop will attain such heights.






