# TOWN HALL MEETING BRIEFS RESIDENTS ON NEW FISCAL YEAR BUDGET

#### Operating expenses for Village reviewed

Ted Lansing, Treasurer, Leisure Village Board of Directors, hosted the LV Town Hall on January 16, to present the proposed

LVA Budget for the fiscal year 2018-19, which begins on April 1. The proposal anticipates annual revenue of \$11,465,616 as well as expenses



of \$11,847,232, resulting in a shortfall for the year of \$381,616. Those figures lead to an increase in homeowner assessments of 3.16%

fees is among several expenses expected to grow over the next several months. As well, \$10,563 in gas and oil for vehicles, \$12,751 in safety and other fees, \$33,627 for telephone equipment maintenance, \$8,753 for electricity cost increase, a sewage treatment increase of \$50,423, and trash pickup will rise by an additional \$33,897. On the positive side, costs for workmen's compensation coverage are expected to decrease by nearly \$20.000. Assuming an average monthly homeowner assessment of \$500, the potential increase would be approximately \$16.

George Jones, chairman of the 13-member LV Finance Committee, believes most of this year's projected increase can be attrib-

An anticipated increase in legal es is among several expenses spected to grow over the next everal months. As well, \$10,563 in as and oil for vehicles, \$12,751 in fety and other fees, \$33,627 for lephone equipment maintenance, uted to employee cost increases. Salary increases are higher because of a rise in the national minimum wage, elevating them by 2.5 percent. Salaries this year will account for about .5 percent of the assessment increase.

A second factor affecting the cost increase is a substantial up-tick in utilities charges. LVA spends \$800,000 annually for water, sewer, trash collection, all of which go up in cost every year.

On the income side, plans are being considered to inaugurate a vehicle access fee for contractors entering the village. The Leisure Village Association will begin charging contractors for bringing in their six-ton trucks and dumpsters, because they cost us in wear and

# She Brought a Gift for the Village

When Judy Blake moved to the Village, she brought the usual van full of furniture, dishes, and keepsakes from her long and happy life in Northern California. She also brought a present for Leisure Village residents, although she didn't unpack it right away.

"I was lonely here at first," she admits. Her husband had died suddenly a year before, and moving south closer to her son and grand-daughter made sense. But she left "great friends and an active life in community theatre – acting and directing," she recalls. Here, her first connection was thanks to her dog. Walking her regularly brought her pup-to-pup with neighbors. "So I joined the Pet Club," she laughs, and

she began to make friends. Soon after that, she decided to bring out the gift she brought from her previous life.

"I wanted to start a Readers' Theatre here," says Judy. "It's a unique form of dramatic presentation in which the actors don't have to learn their lines; they sit on stage and read them directly to the audience. No memorization, no costumes, fewer rehearsals, it is pure entertainment. It has great value to the audience and great value for the actors."

Judy, who acted professionally (mostly on TV and stage) as a young woman, learned about Readers Theatre in her community theatre work. "It's so freeing for anyone who wants to express themselves, even if they've never acted before," she explains.

#### **SENIORS & SAFE DRIVING**



tear on our roadways. In the future, contractors will have to pay a fee to make sure Association money isn't spent on their damage. The new policy could see a \$30,000 annual income from the fees.

In addition, plans are being made to open certain LV communications periodicals to paid advertisers, such as Leisure Village eNews, the on-line subscriber news and information source, and the Village Voice, a newsletter mailed monthly to all residents.

The official fiscal year 2018-19 budget adoption by the LV Board of Directors will take place during the February Open Board meeting set for Monday, February 5.

LV residents can expect a notice to arrive in the mail by the end of February, to announce the budget and potential percentage increase in assessment. The mailing runs about 40 pages and includes budget information, revenues data, and additional documentation mandated by law.

# Mavericks: a Club Just for the Fun of It

The idea began in 2005 when some residents who were still working talked about finding something to do in the Village at night. They held a meeting to exchange ideas; thirteen people attended. "The second meeting was attended by 40," recalls Aleta Howarth, who became the group's first president. "Too many for anyone's home. When we asked for a room in the Rec Center, we were told we had to be a club. So we became one." They wrote bylaws with a simple goal: a place to meet others with similar interests. "We had lists; those who liked movies, who wanted a book club, who favored rock n' roll dances," she remembers. "So you could contact someone on that list to get together." Their first choice for a name was "The Village People." But all residents are Village people. So they settled on The Mavericks.

Over the next dozen years, the Mavericks has grown into that "easy" organization, as John Wirtz describes it. "We are about fun, entertainment, and an easy way to meet other Villagers, period!" he says with a smile. No fundraisers, no heavy-duty rules, or relentless work involved. "Our only 'work' is to plan a monthly event where people can enjoy themselves without any other motive," he adds. A lively Board of Directors works with him to keep the good times rolling.

What began as a dance or a movie rather quickly morphed into a calendar of very creative events. Members suggested new ideas, some of which are now Mavericks' institutions. "Some stuck, some didn't," says John. The Annual \$20 Fashion Show is one that stuck. Models who create their own outfits by spending a maximum of \$20 at a thrift store sashay down the runway showing off their personal and economical style. The first year the most popular attire was worn by John Wirtz. "No one ever said men weren't welcome to participate," he laughs.

Added to the list of Mavericks' favorites: "Casino Night" in which professional dealers, poker tables, and roulette wheels fill the AR for hundreds of lucky gamblers; "Cash in the Attic" provides Villagers a chance to donate old treasures to be auctioned off for fun and funds to support the Mavericks' other events.

The Mavericks now number 230 members, dues are \$5 a year – a bargain, says John Wirtz. He's been president of the club for 6 years. Isn't he burned out? "No," he laughs. "I'm having too much fun."



# Grandson's Journey Earns Bragging Rights

There are times in one's life when an event so remarkable may happen that you want to shout out to the world. This is a newsworthy story I must share with my neighbors here in Leisure Village. Perhaps you have read some of this story in the newspapers, or heard of it on TV. But the whole story has not been told in the manner I know it.

In June of this past year I received a call from my daughter when she advised me that there would be a TV news program in which my grandson Drew Principe would be featured. Drew, a student at Viewpoint High School in Calabasas, attended a presentation given by Henry Oster, a holocaust survivor. There are many holocaust stories, but this was different.

Henry Oster, born in 1928, grew up in Germany in a middle-class Jewish family. His childhood was

in 1933. In the special assembly, Henry related to Drew and his classmates the story of the years between 1933 and the time he and his family were taken to the Lodz ghetto in 1941. In the presentation, Henry shared that he had prepared for his Bar Mitzvah, but was relocated two weeks before it could take place. He never had a Bar Mitzvah.

My grandson was so touched by Henry's story that he felt compelled to speak with him. Drew gifted Henry with a special bracelet he had acquired while in Israel at age 14 and they began a beautiful friendship between a seventeen-year-old and a 91-yearold holocaust survivor. Drew suggested Henry travel to Israel for the first time in his life and have a Bar Mitzvah at the Wall.

Drew committed to raising the funds for Henry and his wife to make the trip. Hence, a group of fifty people, including Drew and in the special event.

It is with great pride and humility that I can now claim "bragging rights" while sharing my grand-

normal until Hitler came to power his family, traveled to Israel to share son's grand gesture. A documentary has been made and posted on YouTube under Drew Principe entitled "listen edit v7", where the complete story is told.

Their most recent performance was just before Christmas in the AR before more than a hundred people. Fourteen Village Readers entertained with jokes and an original holiday story. When the audience laughed and applauded, "We knew that experience was a gift we were giving to them," Judy says with a smile, "We liked it."

# **Local Veterans Invited to Vietnam War Event**

A discussion of the impact and legacy of the Vietnam War will be the focus of an upcoming event honoring Camarillo-area veterans who served in the war years from 1955 to 1975. A panel discussion, "The Vietnam War: What It Means for Us Today," will be held on Saturday, February 10 at the Rancho Campana High School Performing Arts Center in Camarillo, beginning at 10:00 a.m. The event is free and open to the public.



My dinner was panned, when I cooked canned. I was not one of the chosen, when my peas were frozen. My kudos were best, when I cooked fresh for every guest. – L. Swartz

The other one is unrelated to where people grew up. Everyone seems to have a story about getting a call from



their mom at work saying to a 12 year old: you need to prepare dinner tonight, we're going to be late. That's how it started with Helene in Village 40, and that's where the title of this month's column comes from. She was asked to make hamburgers and,

well, one time they were, should I say, slightly overdone, and the other time, drastically underdone.

That's when Helene decided to just throw it all in to one pot and she eventually became the soup maven. Her grandkids love her soups. Since what we call winter is here, it's a good time to think about just making a big pot of soup and using it for 3-4 lunches or dinners, maybe more. Helene is really good at the standards, you know - chicken, split pea, and tomato, but this soup is a little different...so thick it is almost like a stew. Some folks like a heartier flavor, so you could use chicken flavored stock instead of water if you like, but if you do, delete the salt stated in the recipe below.
