Circle of life: LV resident finds 2 links to the past

The Ventura County Star, there was an article written by Arthur Cyr, professor at Carthage College, about the Battle of the Bulge. I was inspired to write the following:

My husband, Robert Hasen, 1st sergeant of the 546th Infantry in Gen. George Patton's Third Army, often mentioned his experience during that battle.


It was the coldest winter on record in the Ardennes Forest in Belgium. They were trapped by the Germans, out of food and gasoline, and suffered frostbite.

Along came an angel, flying at treetop level and risking being shot down, dropping food, medical supplies and gasoline. They were able to move their tanks and to proceed with the battle, suffering many casualties.

That angel was Robert Vanderhaven of Village 1. Preceding that, he Miriam Hasen's late husband, Robert, shown at left, was trapped in the Ardennes Forest in Belgium during World War II. Miriam later learned that Robert Vanderhaven of Village 1, shown at top, had taken part in the air drop that saved Robert and other soldiers in what would become known as the Battle of the Bulge.

I told Bob Vanderhaven that I am here because of him. Many people know him as the man behind the videocamera in the AR and at LVTV, doing many required chores. He is now retired, but he is happy to talk about those days and his subsequent life with Elaine.

Springtime is approaching. This could be a good time to think about home maintenance.

To be safe, change the battery in your home smoke alarms twice a year and then test them for proper operation. If your home has a carbon monoxide alarm, testing and battery change should take place at the same time.

Verify that your water heater is properly strapped and solidly "blocked" to the wall to prevent it from falling

in the event of an earthquake. Tall furniture such as china cabinets and bookshelves should be attached to the walls as well. It has been quite a while since we have experienced a major earthquake in our area; however, it's really important to maintain an adequate supply of canned foods and water to last for at least four days. One gallon of water per person, per day, is the recommendation.

March 24 will feature Dustin Anderson, a chef and caterer who has appeared on the Food Network.


And on March 31, the last of this series, Dr. Daniel Furst, professor of rheumatology and director of clinical research at UCLA, will be the featured speaker.

WRITERS CORNER

Comfort in the kitchen

My wife, Ruth, was a full-time career woman with three daughters and a husband to feed. How did she do it? She was creative and theatrical. She dreamed up a character who burnt everything. I finally got the joke.

Out of compassion for my daughters, I enlisted as the family cook. Of course, I too, had a fulltime job. I could not burn everything. Ruth had already seized that role. I had no alternative but to become efficient in the culinary department.

Living in Leisure Village today, I find that years of practice have turned into a valuable habit. Frugality, health and timeliness are important issues. When I tell charming neighbors that I cook entirely for myself, I meet with these responses: "I don't have enough time." "I had enough of cooking when I had a family to feed." "I don't like to cook." "I would rather be asked out to a nice restaurant."

My applied cooking method resolves these problems. Try it and see.

1. Select one early morning to devote about 1 1/2 hours to food preparation for the entire week. The morning I selected is Sunday from 5 to 7 a.m.

2. Select an entertaining radio station. The radio station I listen to is National Public Radio, 88.3 FM. The "City Arts

and Lectures" features celebrated writers and thinkers addressing contemporary ideas and values. If you run overtime, there's a follow-up with commentaries from Senior News Analyst Daniel Schorr and a word quiz with puzzlemaster Will Shortz. Let the radio entertain you while you cook.

3. Select an assemblage

of healthy, inexpensive edibles that are ingredient-compatible and can be purchased in mass quantities to be coordinated into multi-meals. Pastas and rice have prolonged shelf life. Canned goods such as broths, seafoods, vegetables and meats also have lasting value. Fresh veggies and fruits

can be frozen. Put them all together, package for rotation in the freezer, and you have the basics for a week worth of meals.

The trick is to prepare all of the meals simultaneously. You will find that it takes just as long to cook many meals at one time as it does to cook one meal alone if you plan accordingly. Also, a great time and cost saver involves purchasing an already rotisserie prepared chicken. Here is an example of

efficient menus for one week:

1. Select any combinations of rice; pasta; vegetable; poultry; chicken, vegetable or beef broth; etc. in large volume. Add vegetables, chicken, or beef.

2. Preheat oven to 300 degrees F. Cook.

That's it. The rest is just a simple matter of advanced planning. For example, here is a menu of dinners for one week: chicken noodle soup; meatballs and spaghetti; tuna or chicken salad; Jewish style cabbage soup; Japanese Ramen Noodles with chicken; meatloaf; and Coq au Vin. (Sure. Red wine keeps well.) Cook them all at one time.

Place in meal-portioned containers, freeze and remove to refrigerator a day before serving.

You may ask, what about the fair neighbor who said, "I would rather be asked out to a nice restaurant"? Send me her phone number.

My husband was sent out by Gen. Patton to find a prisoner-of-war camp because his son-in-law had been captured. Taking two men in a Jeep, they couldn't find a POW camp, instead coming upon the black iron gates of Ohrdruf Concentration Camp in the Black Forest. He overpowered the commander and tried to help the four dozen or so prisoners who couldn't stand because they were so weak from starvation.

Another time, Gerald was with four men, once again on the run from the German army. They decided to hide and sleep in a barn. In his dream, Gerald's mother, told him that they should not stay in the barn and to leave immediately. Gerald woke the others, but they did not want to leave and went back to sleep. Gerald also

that, nor did the Allies have knowledge of this. My husband radioed headquarters and asked for medics and food. In the meantime, he ordered the commander to bathe the inmates and hose out the barracks. Outside were thousands of bodies stacked up like cord wood.

The next day, the three generals — Omar Bradley, Patton and Dwight D. Eisenhower — were there. There is a picture of that event hanging on my den wall, with my husband and some of his buddies in the background.

At a family Thanksgiving Dinner in November, I was introduced to a 95-

that they should leave the barn. This time, they decided to leave. A few days later, they returned to the site of the barn and saw that it had been burned to the ground.

In 1948, Gerald came to America to start a new life. He learned to speak English, went to school, became an accountant and eventually married. His new wife, Inge, a former Passover Queen, had also come over from Europe to build a new life in America.

Gerald and Inge have two children, Ruth and Mark. Ruth enjoys working with children and has been a public school teacher for many years. Mark spent some time in year-old gentleman who was a prisoner at Ohrdruf. Yes, he remembered "the young soldier boy" who entered the camp and took control of the commander. He had talked with my husband and said that he was in three camps, including Auschwitz in Poland. He said he had hoped to see the sergeant again some day, in peace time.

Well, he did — through me! We hugged and kissed and, oh!, how I wished that my husband had been there to enjoy that blessed Thanksgiving Day.

Does life come full circle? Yes, indeed.

"Why am I still alive?" The answer to Gerald's question is demonstrated in his life story. The answer is in his courage to not give in to hopelessness, in his strength to begin again, and in the memories he cherishes in his heart.

Gerald Malenbaum is a survivor. He is a testament to the power of the human spirit. We at Leisure Village are honored by his presence in our community.

Our next monthly meeting is scheduled for March 24.


