Jack will be remembered for his "joke telling." He enlightened everyone who met him and will surely be missed and never forgotten by those who loved him. No memorial service will be held, except that his ashes will be spread in the ocean by the Neptune Society — way out in the ocean.

Continued from 1 when it was Channel 12, then Channel 8, Jack was a

part of it.

But I knew him long before either of us ever moved into the Village.

Back in the 1950s, Jack was an Air Force officer, heading up the Los Angeles Public Affairs Office for the Secretary of the Air Force, designated that SAFPAO.

It was Jack's job to make sure the Air Force got publicity, that it was positive, and that it led to increased enlistments.

Under his careful guidance, many movies were made that produced a high and polished profile of his branch. One of the finest of these films, the one Jack was most proud of, was "Battle Hymn."

The movie was the true life story of Jack's friend, Dean Hess, a former Air Force Colonel who served admirably in World War II as a fighter pilot. An ordained minister, Hess realized that he could not in good conscience persuade youngsters to join the Armed Forces

unless he led by example. He joined the Army Air Force and flew a P-47 in 64 missions against the Germans. After the war, Hess returned to his ministry.

Then, when the Korean conflict erupted, Hess was called back to service and flew a P-51 on more than 250 combat missions. In between flights, he established orphanages in Korea, saving the lives of thousands of children who were victims of that conflict.

Using Hess's book, Jack actively pursued a film project. Eventually, in 1957, Rock Hudson played Hess in what became a smash hit film. Jack was present during most of the filming, acting as a liaison between Universal Pictures and the Air Force, persuading the brass in the Pentagon to provide more planes, landing fields, and whatever else was necessary at no cost. Jack was good at that.

After he retired, Jack went into public relations, a field he never really left, even when he moved to Leisure Village. He was always occupied with helping this or that cause, interview-

ing newcomers for Channel 25 and writing numerous articles for "Inside Leisure Village" and other publications.

Even after losing his wife and suffering his first stroke, Jack attended as many meetings as possible and was always ready to offer new ideas for publicizing the channel. He was alive with ideas for new shows that would enhance the Villagers and the image of the Village itself.

Always self-effacing, Jack was uncomfortable with publicity about himself. He only wanted it for others, preferring to remain in the background, helping — always helping — others. Of course, in helping others, he could not avoid becoming visible to others himself.

The work Jack did is never finished. With his passing, there will be a void in Leisure Village.

A wonderful, quiet, kind individual, totally committed to his projects, he will be missed and remembered by all.

As he might have written it, Jack Whalen was that kind of a guy.

Vou can't buy a home cheaper anywhere in Ventura County than in Leisure Village, yet there are approximately 70 homes for sale here. I don't doubt that more homes will go up for sale when an increase in basic monthly assessments, plus a special assessment, hits homeowners. More homes for sale equals lower prices.

Solutions to consider:

• Check into hiring outside management.

• Wait until one major project, such as the \$1.5 million landscape project, is completed next year before initiating another one.

• Obtain a loan to fund the water management project rather than assess homeowners for something that may not be completed in their lifetime.

Disbanding important committees is not in the Leisure Village Association's best interests. Instead, we should arm committees with the information they need, and then heed their expertise in order to achieve a realistic budget. Measures must be implemented now to stop the exodus of homeowners before property values decline even further.

#### Editor's response

As Editor of Inside Leisure Village, it is my policy to avoid direct responses to letters and columns that appear.

However, your letter demands some response to what I see as false assumptions upon which you base your suggestions and conclusions.

The following information was obtained by individual interviews with Peggy Marcketta, the broker and principal of Fox Home Real Estate, and Sharon Parker, an agent of Troop Real Estate, Inc.

There are approximately

54 houses for sale in the Village. This is down from a recent high of 71 a few months ago. This amount has accumulated through the normal attrition of the residents.

Homes are not selling for several reasons. Residential real estate sales in Ventura County have declined 5.9 percent in the past year. The overall market has been slow throughout California and beyond. The market is normally slow from late October through December. The market in Camarillo has picked up activity, however, since the new year.

The most important reason is that Village sales depend on potential buyers being able to sell their homes first. Unlike younger, first-time buyers, who have broader financing potentials, older buyers focus on getting the money out of their current homes, often hoping to pay cash.

No evidence supports a claim that people move

in or out of Leisure Village because of our assessments. Realtors Marcketta and Parker have stated that when they explain what the dues include, most buyers feel that they are getting a bargain.

Marcketta and Parker cite many other more important reasons why people move out of the Village. Not necessarily in order, Villagers move away to enter assisted living or nursing homes, to move in with or near close relatives, and, of course, they pass on.

The statement that there is currently a \$1.5 million landscape project is incorrect. The largest landscape project currently existing in the Village is a spraying contract of approximately \$400,000 spread over three years, and we are currently in the second year. This information was obtained from Mike Undem, our Landscape Superintendent.

If a loan is obtained to pay for the Water Manage-

ment Project, funds must be found to pay for the loan, plus interest.

No important Committees have been disbanded. If Ms. Pemberton refers to the Purchase Research Committee, it is now the Purchase Review Committee and has changed its reporting from a monthly to a quarterly review. This action underscores a basic fact of the Village structure: All Committees are only advisory and serve at the sole discretion of our Board of Directors.

Though we may feel sheltered here, we should not forget that our Village reflects the overall real estate market. The value of our homes and the appeal of our community to potential buyers demands that we maintain our service and our quality of life. As immediate past history should have taught us, the costs of those tangible and intangible assets cannot be wished away or ignored by basing objections on incorrect assumptions or quick fixes.

I will sincerely miss you, my friend.





# Classic film noir 'The Third Man' screens Feb. 11

In January we saw some priceless footage from the Charlie Chaplin vaults and some background footage from Buster Keaton's collec-

This month, we continue with our exploration of films from Great Britain with "The Third Man."

Recently the British Film Institute released its list of the 100 best British films of all time. No. 1 on the list is "The Third Man."

Sir Carol Reed directed this film in Vienna in 1949. Vienna was still partly in ruins. The cinematographer, Robert Krasker, made fine use of the odd shadows and streams of light fashioned by the wreckages of buildings, giving the movie such wonderful atmosphere.

The music, familiar the world over, was composed

and performed on the zither by Anton Karas. This was Karas' chef-d'oeuvre. He wrote music for several more movies, but none was as successful as this.

When Sarah and I were in Budapest last year, we had dinner at a little restaurant where two Hungarian Zigeuner musicians were playing the violin and cimbalom, a Hungarian stringed instrument played with small hammers striking the strings. I requested "The Third Man Theme," and the zimbalist obliged me by plucking the strings with his fingers to give the sound of the zither. I tipped him a couple hundred forint for the privilege - don't worry, there are 195 forint to the dollar. The musicians also claimed to have known Anton Karas in person. But then, I claim to have known

Groucho Marx.

Orson Welles famously played the role of Harry Lime in the film. He was busy rebuilding his reputation, which had been trashed by the Hearst syndicate after his classic film, "Citizen Kane," parodied the life of William Randolph Hearst, Always a larger-than-life character, he dominated the film as he dominated everything else.

I once worked on a film in New York in which he had a bit part. He rewrote every scene he was in and insisted that the director use his version. Welles' version, of course, was far better that the original, and the rest of the film suffers by compari-

Bernard Lee plays a British officer in the film. You will recognize him as the character "M" in the James Bond series. And you will recognize Wilfrid Hyde-White, who also played Col. Pickering in "My Fair Lady." Joseph Cotton was a

well-known star. He first appeared in "Citizen Kane," then in several more Welles films. In all, his career spanned 40 years and 80 films.

Reed, the director, later won an Oscar for "Oliver!" and was nominated for Oscars for "The Third Man" and "The Fallen Idol," another British classic.

The Ferris Wheel sequence was filmed in a car in the famous Ferris Wheel in the Prater, Vienna's huge amusement park. I rode it once in 2005 when I produced a film in Vienna. I am not sure I was in the same car that Orson Welles was in, but I always wondered.

"The Third Man" is a classic film noir. There is no "happy ending" as we know it. The photography and



## Citizens Academy begins soon

There's a new sheriff in town.

Commander Steve DeCesari assumed office in September, succeeding Commander Mike Lewis, who became Chief of Police in Simi Valley.

For those of you who would like to meet the person who is now responsible for maintaining law and order in our city, you are invited to join the Citizen Academy Program, beginning on Tuesday, Feb. 27, at 6 p.m.

The Citizen Academy is a program offered by the City of Camarillo to acquaint the citizens of our city with the workings of our law enforcement department, as well as our criminal justice system, including the judges, prosecutors and the public defenders, all of whom are involved in our court system.

You will find out why we do not have a single policeman (in the usual blue

uniform) on duty, but rely on sheriff's deputies. And we don't even have our own sheriffs but contract them from the county.

This last may seem peculiar, but by sharing costs with the rest of the county, we are able to utilize, maintain and benefit from such up-to-date equipment as a helicopter squadron for search, rescue and medical evacuation duties: narcotics specialists; and a SWAT team. We have a state-ofthe-art, fully equipped bomb squad. We have a canine corps. Visit our jails, both adult and juvenile, and our modern crime labs.

All this and more is available to you, without cost. Classes are held on successive Tuesdays from 6 to 9 p.m. in the Community Room at the Camarillo Police Station. The next class is scheduled to begin on Feb. 27. Registration is required, so pick up a form at the Police Station, or call Robert at 484-5568 for one.

# Color your world — or at least your house trim

This year's paint contract is for Villages 23, 25, 26, 28, 34, 35, 37 and 38.

Have you and your roofmates talked about the new colors? Are you interested in a change of your trim color?

This is a good way to start the new year. Talk to your neighbors and take a tour or walk together through Village 32. This Village has a wonderful sampling of all the new colors. which are: LV Brick, Kale Green (light green), Willow (gray blue) and Mariposa (a darker blue green). Jot down addresses of the trim color you would consider using.

Each Village will have a sprinkling of the new colors, alternating with our existing monochromatic colors: Navajo White (garage doors), Butter Pecan (like the ice cream), Daplin (a color similar to the slumpstone block walls) and LV#1 (the darkest brown presently painted on the wooden divider and 3foot fences). Wooden fences will be painted Daplin in this contract.

Please note: The stucco is never painted and is a totally different process.

You also may be aware of LV maintenance checking your home for termite and dry rot damage. The homeowner is responsible for all termite repair and will be notified by the office. Wood replacement due to dry rot is being replaced by the Village.

How do we, Architectural Committee representatives, select the trim color changes? The most important factor that we look at is the color of the stucco. We choose houses that would look better with a color change and ask the homeowners if they agree. Owner roofmates must agree, and with buildings larger than two units, the majority rules. The Architectural Representatives have final



# Camarillo Police warn of lottery scam

The Camarillo Police Department has received reports of a lottery scam operating in our area.

Residents have been receiving letters in the mail informing them they have won a large sum of money in an international lottery program. A check is sent along with the letter. The letter indicates the check was sent to assist them in paying the taxes or "clearance fees" that must be paid before they can receive the

grand prize. The recipients are instructed to deposit the check into their account and then wire the money (usually outside the United States) to cover the taxes or "clearance fees."

Letters such as those described above are scams! People fall victim to this type of scam every day because they are led to believe they have won a large sum of money. Here's the hitch: No such lottery exists, and no winnings are ever sent.

The scam works because the check that is sent along with the letter is deposited to the victim's account, and then the victim wires the money to a specified location. Once the money is wired and picked up, there is no way to trace it. It isn't until a few days afterward that the deposited check is identified as fraudulent.

There are several variations to this type of scam, including notifications made by telephone.

The Camarillo Police Departments advises residents:

· If you have doubts about a caller, hang up.

· Never send any money in order to receive a prize.

• Never give out private financial information.

• If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

· Would a change in mailboxes free up parking space and speed postal delivery time?

· And is it time for a reasonable and believable census of just who lives in this Village?

Jerry Rosen and former Board President Jack Prosen want more and wider discussion of the pros and cons of outside management, a provocative idea that would affect all of us. It certainly could qualify as a "hot button" issue.

Does the Village have to maintain its current, physical appearance? Visitors and newcomers have likened the historic look to an Army base. Increasingly, younger newcomers are used to more space and variety of appearance than many residences now offer. Does that mean we should consider even more "color" and design alterations for the future?

When I asked about solar energy and possible changes to mailbox locations, I was told that both had been considered and rejected in the past, and that was that! But is it? Should it be?

Despite the past, if saving money was a big justification for our ongoing. partial switch to recycled water, what about savings by switching some facilities and/or homes to solar? Whatever a past study came up with, what's wrong with a new study? Is it possible that a solar manufacturer or utility company would consider "model" testing or a joint venture with the Village? Tax incentives, rebates and electricity buy-back plans might mean great savings for the next generation of Villagers, some of whom already live here.

Another possible improvement would be changing mail drops. If each culde-sac, or cluster, had just one drop, as is the case in newer developments bordering the Village, could space usage and delivery times be improved? A mail carrier told me a proposal to move mailboxes had been rejected in the past, and that was that - another "no change, ever," apparently carved in concrete.

Finally, Board policies, assumptions, services and improvements should be based on accurate information about who we really are, what we want and what we think we might really need. Do the Board and its committees have an accurate picture of who it serves?

A survey, a census of the

residents, could provide that picture. Such information is necessary for effective, accurate planning to enhance the Village's quality of life and its property values.

A full assessment of resident attitudes also could help identify the apparent disconnect that has been cutting down the number of people willing to volunteer for committees. A few dozen, or even a few hundred Villagers participating in this or that program is only a drop in the bucket compared to those who do not participate. Do we know why? Should we know?

I recall a committee meeting in which a member said he knew what the residents wanted on a particular subject. In later conversation, it turned out his knowledge was based the complaint of a single telephone caller. I've heard others use one or two casual conversations with people they know as "evidence" of what residents want.

We need an accurate, upto-date picture of just who Leisure Village is.

After all, many of us have invested what we trust is the best part of the rest of our lives here - it would be good to know more about who the rest of us are, what we want from our community and what we are willing to give.






