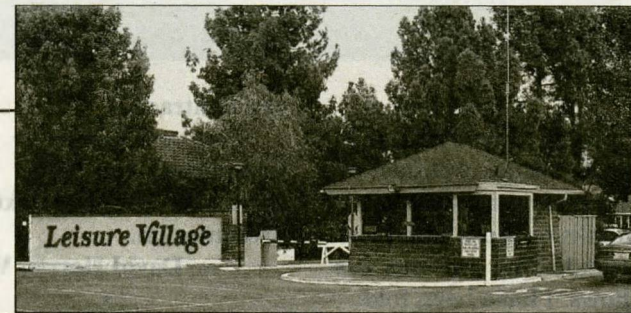

4 express views at Candidates Night

Four candidates — incumbent Bob McQuivey, Hanna Huber, Lynn Holmes and Lin Grant — are vying for two open seats on the Leisure Village Board of Directors. The election will be this month.

The open seats belong to Marge Lorraine, whose term is over, and McQuivey, who is running for a second term. He is currently the Board president.

The candidates appeared in the AR Thursday evening, May 22, for Candidates Night. There, they were able to make statements on their qualifications and their objectives for Leisure Village,

Some remarks by the candidates:

McQuivey pledged open meetings to keep residents aware of all discussion and actions that require Board approval.

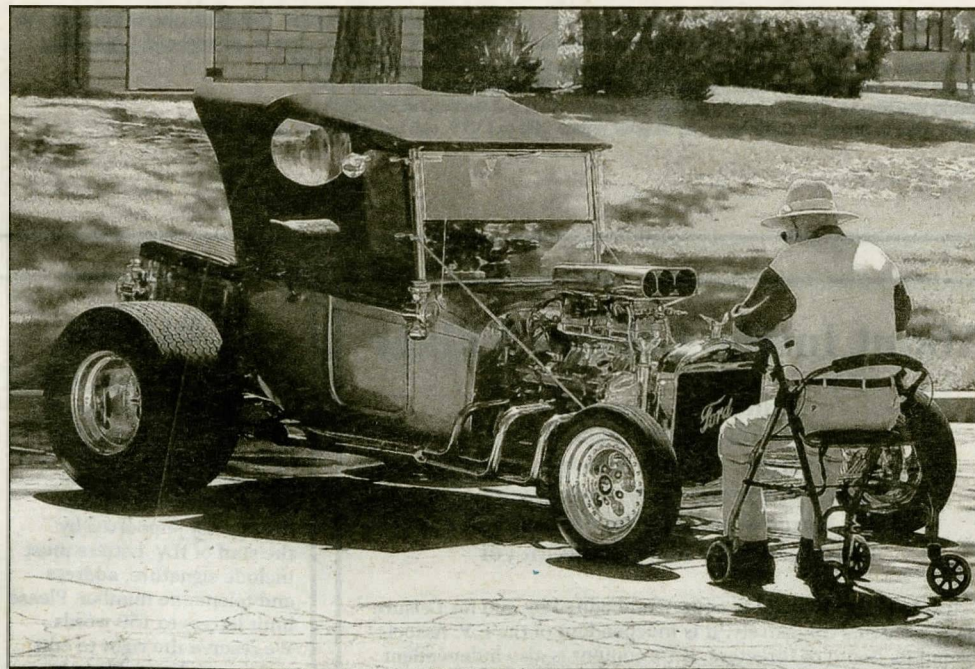
Huber cited overwatering in the Village as needing to be corrected to save costs. She also wants improvements of the crosswalks, which she believes need enhancement to better protect pedestrians crossing.

Holmes would work to

minimize the Association assessments.

Grant would work to install solar heating and air conditioning in the main building as well as the pool area.

Bits from the Board, May 5

Some items discussed at the May 5 Open Board Meeting:

Absentee ballots for our upcoming election will soon be available and will be accepted until 5 p.m. June 25.

The annual election packet has been drafted and the agenda will be mailed out in the next week

RV decals were distributed at the Rec Center on May 31. All vehicles had to be driven to the center, making sure all decaled RVs were operative. Many rigs hadn't been moved for years, and those that are

unable to run and were not decaled are in violation and subject to fines.

Those vehicles that were not available during May can go to the west gate to obtain their decals.

On July 1, the law against using hand-held wireless phones in vehicles will take effect, and it will include vehicles in Leisure Village.

The reclaimed water project will be completed by the beginning of December 2008.

At the May 19 meeting, Ted Lansing reported a new scam alert. Companies are asking for \$95 to reassess your property.

You can do this yourself by calling the Assessor's Office at 654-2181 and having the forms sent to you at no charge.

At the present time, Rule 4.06 provides that the parking area at the Rec Center not be used for storage or overnight parking. The Travel Club needs to have a parking area for people participating in overnight trips. The Safety & Security Committee proposed an amendment to the existing rule to allow parking at the Rec Center East parking lot and the space close to Village 14 restricted to those participating in those trips.

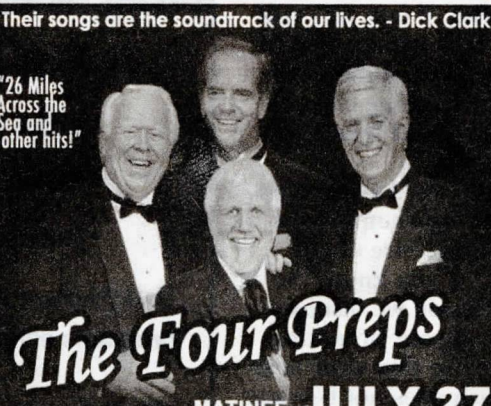

The next available class in the Village will be Thursday, Sept. 18, in the MPR from 1 to 5:30 p.m. This is a four-hour, accelerated class offered by AARP for the benefit of licensed drivers in Leisure Village who want to continue safe driving.

California law requires that insurance companies give a discount to everyone who takes this class. If you are 70 years or older and need to renew your drivers license, you will be required to pass a written test. This course will be helpful to prepare you for the test.

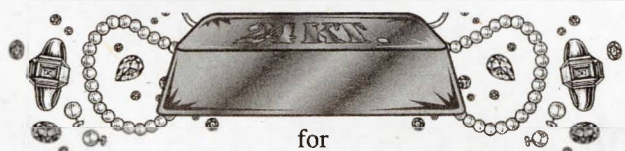

Jury duty scam leads to ID theft

The jury duty scam. Here's how it works:

The scammer calls claiming to be a sheriff and claims that he has a bench warrant for your arrest for not showing up on jury duty.

You will often rightly claim you never received the jury duty notification.

The sheriff tells you that the notice was not returned, it must have been delivered and you did not show up for jury duty.

You ask how you can settle this. You are advised that a \$25 fine can be paid over the phone. You are asked to give a credit card

number and the three-digit code on the back.

Some scammers ask for your Social Security number, birth date and sometimes other private information — exactly what the scammer needs to commit identity theft.

Why does this work? The victim is clearly caught off guard and is understandably upset at the prospect of a warrant being issued for his or her arrest.

Elderly people respect the police and don't want to get in trouble; thus you are much less likely to be vigilant about protecting your confidential informa-

tion.

Remember, the sheriff's office or police department will never call you to ask for credit card numbers, Social Security numbers or other private information. In fact, most courts follow up via snail mail and rarely, if ever, call prospective jurors.

Never give out your Social Security number, credit card numbers or other personal confidential information when you receive a telephone call.

Protecting yourself is simple: Never give this information out when you receive a phone call.

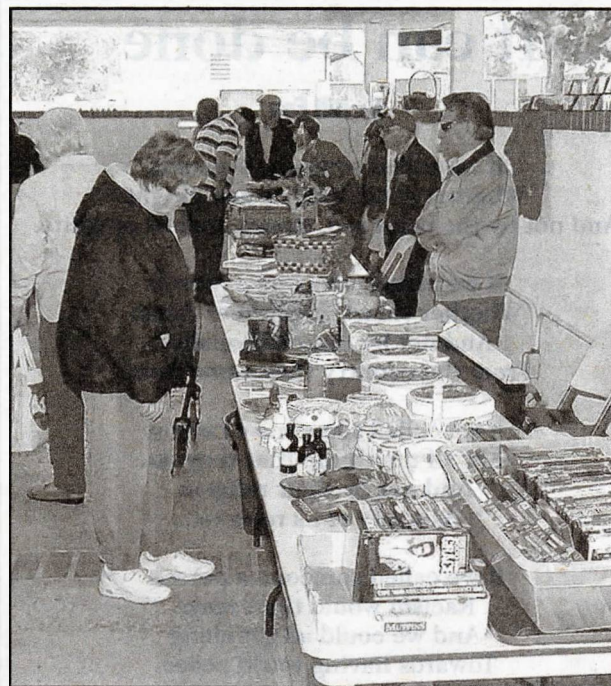
Do you find it difficult to leave home to shop for groceries due to physical limitations? If so, Shop Ahoy is for you.

Give me 5! Major stroke symptoms

The following is an excerpt taken from a bulletin that appeared in the May 2008 American College of Physicians. It was submitted to ILV by James Brotman, V. 29, a retired board-certified M.D. who received his medical degree from USC in 1945. He practiced internal medicine for many years in Torrance.

A quick check of a major stroke symptoms are:

1. Walk (impaired balance).
2. Talk (slurred speech or facial droop).
3. Reach (weakness or numbness).
4. See (impaired vision).
5. Feel (severe headaches).

Women account for 70 percent of deaths from strokes. The rate of strokes in older women have tripled from 1988 to 1994, compared to 1999-2004.

Early intervention is critical. Don't delay. Call 911. To reverse the stroke, you need emergency care.

The critical time is three hours in order to be diagnosed and treated.

The big killers are heart attacks and strokes.

Another warning sign is daytime dozing among older people — an indication for a high risk of stroke. Women with higher than average waist circumference and higher body index are more likely to have strokes. And, of course, pre-diabetics and diabetics are of higher risk for strokes.

Women especially are less likely to have specific stroke symptoms than men. In general, women will have generalized weakness, fatigue and disorientation more commonly than men.

Other signs are visual problems and confusion, along with walking difficulty, balance or dizziness.

Calling 911 is the only call to make if stroke signs are present.

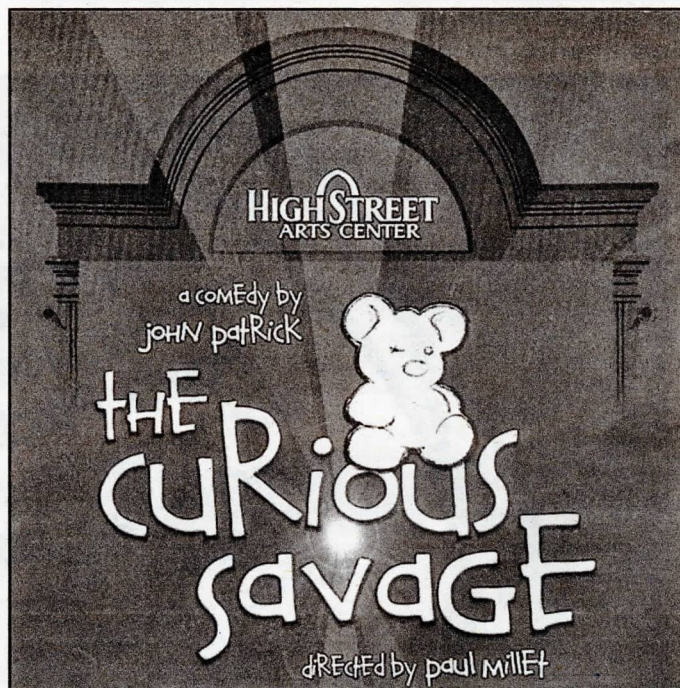

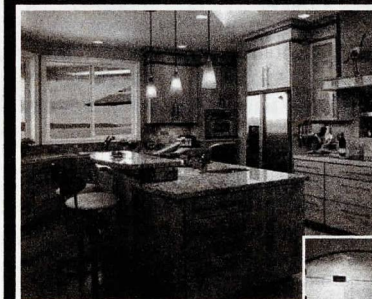

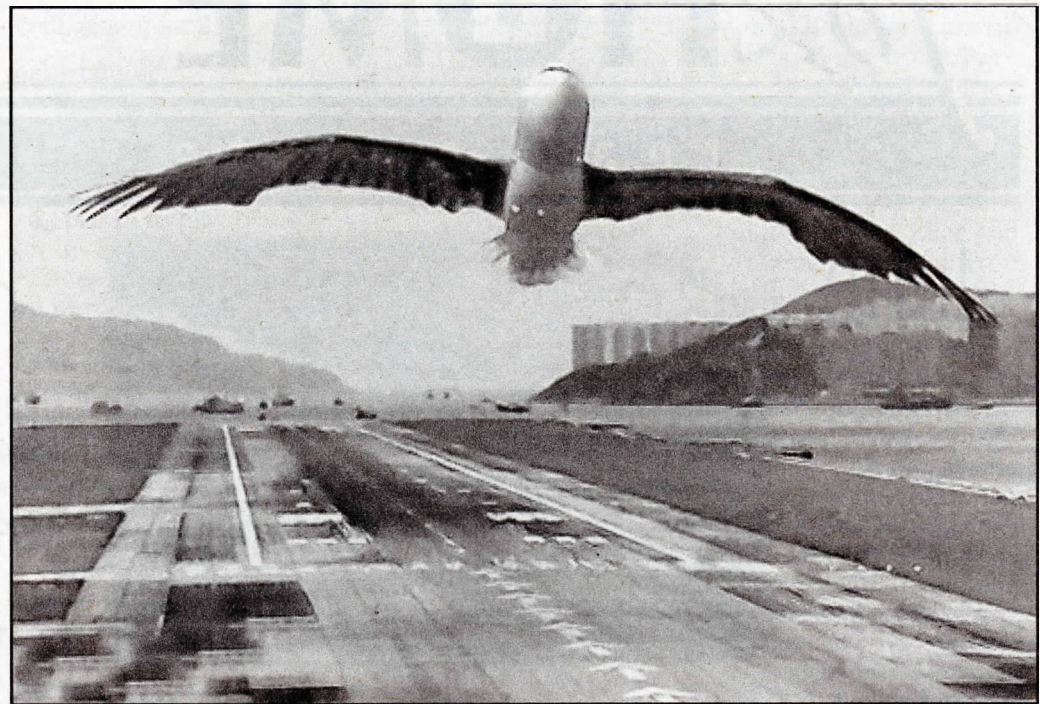

The really great part of

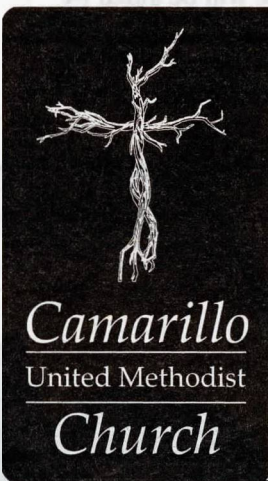
pulling together an event like this is working and talking with people who have a passion for their vehicles and a desire to share them — and the stories behind them — with others.

WIRELESS TELEPHONE LAWS FACTS

As you may have already heard, two new laws dealing with the use of wireless telephones while driving go into effect July 1, 2008. Below is a list of "Frequently Asked Questions" concerning these new laws. Q: WHEN DO THE NEW CELL PHONE LAWS TAKE EFFECT?

A: The new laws take effect July 1, 2008.

Q: WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE TWO LAWS?

A: The first prohibits all drivers from using a handheld wireless telephone while operating a motor vehicle. (Vehicle Code (VC) §23123). Motorists 18 and over may use a hands-free device. Drivers under the age of 18 may NOT use a wireless telephone or hands-free device while operating a motor vehicle (VC §23124).

Q: WHAT IF I NEED TO USE MY TELEPHONE DURING AN EMERGENCY, AND I DO NOT HAVE A HANDS-FREE DEVICE?

A: The law allows a driver to use a wireless telephone to make emergency calls to a law enforcement agency, a medical provider, the fire department, or other emergency services agency.

Q: WHAT ARE THE FINES IF I'M CONVICTED?

A: The base fine for the FIRST offense is \$20 and \$50 for subsequent convictions. According to the Uniform Bail and Penalty Schedule, with the addition of penalty assessments, a first offense is \$76 and a second offense is \$190.

Q: WILL I RECEIVE A POINT ON MY DRIVERS LICENSE IF I'M CONVICTED FOR A VIOLATION OF THE WIRELESS LAW?

A: NO. The violation is a reportable offense; however, DMV will not assign a violation point.

Q: WILL THE CONVICTION APPEAR ON MY DRIVING RECORD?

A: Yes, but the violation point will not be added.

Q: WILL THERE BE A GRACE PERIOD WHEN MOTORISTS WILL ONLY GET A WARNING?

A: NO. The law becomes in effect on July 1, 2008. Whether a citation is issued is always at the discretion of the officer based upon his or her determination of the most appropriate remedy for the situation.

Q: ARE PASSENGERS AFFECTED BY THIS LAW?

A: No. This law only applies to the person driving a motor vehicle.

Q: DO THESE LAWS APPLY TO OUT-OF-STATE DRIVERS WHOSE HOME STATES DO NOT HAVE SUCH LAWS?

A: Yes.

Q: CAN I BE PULLED OVER BY A LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER FOR USING MY HANDHELD WIRELESS TELEPHONE?

A: YES. An officer can pull you over just for this infraction.

Q: WHAT IF MY PHONE HAS A PUSH-TO-TALK FEATURE, CAN I USE THAT?

A: No. The law does provide an exception for those operating a commercial motor truck or truck tractor (excluding pickups), implements of husbandry, farm vehicle or tow truck, to use a two-way radio operated by a "push-to-talk" feature.

Q: WHAT OTHER EXCEPTIONS ARE THERE?

A: Operators of an authorized emergency vehicle during the course of employment are exempt as are those motorists operating a vehicle on private property.
