The cast is composed of Carole Miller, Dick Berman, Annie Robinson, Al









We learn, knowledge from experience tends to flow; To which I humbly add, and when to let things go!





Home warranty policies available

When buying a home, most buyers will request that the seller provide a one-year home warranty insurance policy. The cost of this will vary depending on whether you are insuring a single-family house or a condominium/townhouse and the optional coverage that can be added.

The typical base price for the coverage on a condominium/townhouse or PUD, which we have here in Leisure Village, is \$235 for the year. Many buyers will request an upgrade that will include air conditioning, ranging in price from \$60 to \$105 additional. The base policy does not include washer, dryer or refrigerator, and some purchase agreement offers will request that these appliances be included for approximately \$85 more for the year.

A home warranty policy does provide some security for the new owner, in that once the escrow is closed, if anything goes wrong, the insurance, less the deductible, will most probably pay to make the necessary repairs. This also helps to relieve the seller's potential liability for any problems.

Many people do not realize that they can add a home warranty insurance policy for coverage on their existing home at any time. For more information or questions about this, contact your Realtor.

Citizens Academy begins this month

On Feb. 26, the Camarillo Police Department will begin its 18th Citizens Academy program. It's a 12-week course designed to give citizens an overview of the police department's function and operational procedures.

There will be presentations by a Superior Court judge, K-9 officer, SWAT team members, bomb squad, narcotic officers and many others. Participants will also have the opportunity to meet Camarillo's station commander and get a comprehensive tour of the police station. There will be field trips

to the pre-trial detention facility (main jail) and juvenile hall, sheriff's dispatch and the crime lab, the sheriff's training academy and heliport. Participants will also go on a ride-along with the patrol deputy.

Anyone interested in attending the Citizen's Academy can get an application at the Camarillo Police Station. Potential candidates must be at least 18 years of age, live or work in the Camarillo area, have no felony convictions, and no misdemeanor convictions within one year of applying.

Classes will meet on Tuesday evenings beginning Feb. 26 from 6 to 9 p.m. for 12 weeks and will be held in the community room at the Camarillo Police Station.
