Leisure Village is a **Planned Unit Development** (PUD). It operates under the rules set forth under the Davis-Sterling Act. This Act is authorized by the State of California. The property owners of

Leisure Village elect a Board of Directors. The Board consists of five members. Elections are held every

year in June, with two directors being selected in even-numbered years, and three directors elected in odd-numbered years.

The term of office shall be for two years, and directors may not serve more than two successive terms.

The Board hires a General Manager who is responsible for all personnel who

work for the Village.

The Board, with input from the Finance Committee, prepares an annual budget.

The General Manager runs the day-to-day operations of the Village pursuant to the terms and conditions as set forth in the budget.


LV resident shares his adventures

Kenney was in the National Guard for 18 months. He was only 16 when he went in and had to leave when the guard was federal-



CLASSIC FILMS

Spotlight will shine on British films in 2007

Every country has a wealth of films available to the audience. France, Italy, Germany and Great Britain have all contributed to the rich store of film artistry.

In the silent days, it was much easier to understand what the characters were saying because most of their work was done in good pantomime. When spoken words were needed, the good old title card was used to supply the missing lines. For the foreign market, cards in the appropriate language were substituted for the native language cards. Few people could read lips, as is the case today, so nobody was the wiser.

Then came sound,

around 1927 or so, and suddenly foreign films were less and less popular because people didn't want to be bothered with either the intrusive subtitles or with "dubbing," in which English-speaking actors recreate the dialogue soundtrack in English. That always looks funny because the mouth movements of the actors don't match the words they are speaking. Remember the "Hercules" series starring Steve Reeves is the 1950s? All the actors were speaking in their native tongues. So a mixture of German, Spanish, Italian and Hungarian actors didn't matter. Each spoke his or her native language and all were translated and re-recorded into the languages of the countries in which the films were released.

The one big exception is, naturally, British films. They need no translation to be understood on this side of the pond. So the British film industry has always looked on America as a rich market in which they could release their product without altering the content either with subtitles or by "dubbing."

In fact, some of the greatest directors and actors in America were British. Consider Sir David Lean, whose credits include "Bridge Over the River Kwai," "Lawrence of Arabia," "Dr. Zhivago" "Oliver Twist" and "Great Expectations." Or those famous American actors, Sir Lawrence Olivier, Sir John Gielgud, Angela Lansbury and Alec Guinness. Even Bob Hope was British, born Leslie Townes Hope in London.

The British film tradition is long and illustrious. We plan to devote most if not all of 2007 to this tradition.

We'll start on January 14 at 7 p.m. with a couple of TV shows starring your favorite actor and mine, Charlie Chaplin. Maybe that should have been "Your favorite actor and mime."

Charles Spencer Chaplin was born in London in 1889. He was born into extreme poverty. His first stage appearance was at age 5 in London, when he had to sub for his mother who was too ill to appear. By age 11, he was already regularly appearing on stage. At age 21, Fred Karno's Troupe, of which Charlie was a member, traveled to the United States. Charlie was bitten by the movie bug and he never looked back.

Charlie's understudy was a young man, Arthur Stanley Jefferson, who would later change his name to Stanley Laurel and appear with Oliver Hardy.


Charlie made many short films. His method of working was unique and fascinating. He never had a script. He improvised all his gags. If one didn't work, he tried another until he was



satisfied that the movie was funny enough. He kept his working methods a carefully guarded secret, not to be discovered until the 1980s.


Two film critics, David Gill and Kevin Brownlow, uncovered outtakes from some of Chaplin's most popular films, and these show us Chaplin's method of working. We'll first see the movies themselves and then the outtakes showing how he worked out his gags and how he worked with his actors. This is an extraordinary opportunity to watch a real master at work and to laugh along with him at his foibles and mistakes, and to share in his triumphs. It's

a laugh-filled evening, one you will remember for many years to come.

I can say unabashedly that Chaplin is my very favorite artist of film. He had total control of everything he did. He wrote the scripts, or at least defined what the gags were. He directed, acted, wrote the music, edited the film, and, in fact, controlled every aspect of filmmaking. There has never been so all-encompassing a genius in the film world before or since.

It is appropriate that Charlie Chaplin start our "Year of the British Films." This will be a memorable evening. As usual, there will be popcorn, punch, coffee, and camaraderie. Bring your friends and relatives.

EDITOR'S RECIPE: QUICK NUT OR DATE BREAD

Use a 9-by-5-inch loaf pan. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Have all ingredients at about 70 degrees.

Sift into a bowl:

2 cups all-purpose flour

1/2 cup white or 1/2 cup brown sugar 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder

Melt and cool slightly 2 tablespoons butter Beat until light.

In another bowl, beat together:

1 egg

1 cup milk

¹/₂ teaspoon vanilla

Add the melted butter. Beat the liquid ingredients into the sifted ones until well-mixed. Fold in:

3/4 cup chopped nutmeats, or part dates and part nutmeats.

Place the dough in a greased bread pan and bake about 40 minutes.

At our November meeting, our president, David Harris, posed some questions to those in attendance regarding our three major shows. They overwhelmingly agreed that a new approach would be in the members' best interest.

seas to set up the first airfield for B-29s. The group spent 21 days at sea in a major storm, arriving in Oran, Africa. It took 2 1/2 months for the next move. A Dutch ship, named the Volundam, took the unit to Bombay, India. The ship was badly in need of repairs, but the British needed all ships. It only had half a crew, and men were taken from volunteer prisoners with a promise of a clean record and their citizenship being returned. The cook was a man who had murdered his wife. The refrigerator broke down, food spoiled and many of the crew and passengers became very ill. On the second emergency stop, the cook was taken off in a straight jacket.

They finally arrived in Bombay. Many who were still on board were very ill. The group then took five days crossing India to Piardoba by train. No water was available, and the conditions were primitive and difficult. They arrived so late that the airstrip was nearly completed.

New orders sent Kenney to Kiunglai, China, to oversee the building of another B-29 airstrip. This project is considered one of the greatest engineering feats during the war. 70,000 coolies worked for over three months to complete it using rice straw, mud, gravel and large boulders. In the fall of 1944, 25 missions were flown out of this forward base in China going to Japan. Cargo planes were flying "over the hump" to bring gasoline in for these bombing flights. These flights "over the hump" were considered to be the most dangerous missions in the war. The cargo unit lost over 500 planes. Kenney flew "over the hump" four times.

The unit then received special orders to go to Tinian Island. They took a naval ship to Australia and from there they proceeded to Tinian Island.

The amenities on the base were minimal. There was only one building. It was the latrine. They spent two weeks without a hot meal, waiting for planes to arrive for flights to Japan on bombing missions. Kenney flew five missions to Japan as an Intelligence Observer. On the last mission, his aircraft was hit four times over Osaka. They lost gasoline and were told they could not return to the base in Tinian. They made an emergency landing in Iwo Jima, and their tanks were dry. Iwo Jima was considered a safe harbor for B-29s. It had taken the Marines a full

month to take over Iwo Jima at great risk to themselves. More than 20,000 flyers made safe landings on Iwo Jima, including Kenney.

Kenny was discharged in October, 1945.

I think we should, at this point in our story, talk about the numerous medals and citations Kenney received. One was the Gold Medal of Ethiopia, awarded only to non-Ethiopians with major service to the country. It is awarded by the Emperor. Others include air medals for combat flying; presidential citations, including two for outstanding performance during combat; campaign medals for Africa, India, the United States, Europe, the Korean War and the United Nations; and the Chinese

Memorial for service in China, and many more.

After the war, he went to work at IBM as a computer programmer for two years, but it was too tame. He left and joined the Army in 1947 and attended Criminal Investigation school. He was sent to Japan and assigned Counter Intelligence liaison between CID and CIC. He was assigned to the Port of Yokohama as Investigator.

Back in the States in 1955, Kenney left the Army, but shortly afterward joined the Air Force as a photo interpreter assigned to train navigators to identify targets. He spent five years and was sent to Germany as Photo Interpreter. Then it was on to Ethiopia as a volunteer to train Army and Air Force members on radar intelligence. He returned to the States, continuing in the same job in Massachusetts.

Kenney retired in 1966. Eight days later, by orders of the Secretary of the Navy, he reported to the Naval Intelligence Department as a civilian and remained there for the next 12 years during the Cold War period.

I think we should all be proud of Kenney and all like him. I know I am. Each year since the war, Kenney has attended a wartime reunion of the 58th Bomb Wing of the 462nd Bomb Group. The final reunion was held in Connecticut in 2006 with Kenney attending to say a final goodbye to his wartime friends. The youngest person attending was 83.

Fond farewell to someone who kept the bad guys out

Many who work for the Village tend to be faceless to many of us - without malice, we simply find no reason to give them much thought. We care little about them, often unaware that they follow patterns much like our own, concerned with families and lives beyond our gates. Often, we see them only when we pass back and forth, rarely looking into their faces or hearing their voices. We don't have to, and perhaps we choose not to make the effort.

One such face which became known to me for the person behind it was that of Jack De Pue, who worked at the West Gate. Though his job appeared simple, it was not.

Day in, day out, he checked all who entered the Village, names and licenses, always aware of a "Do not allow" list of those to be denied passage.

He questioned all in vehicles without decals or possessed of written passes against a computer screen full of such items. His shift usually went from 6 a.m. to about 1:45 p.m. every weekday.

Though an ultimately boring task, it called for his constant attention. I know he took his job seriously, managing lunch or a break from the action when an available security person backed him up or when the flow of cars and pedestrians lightened up.

As with all our employees, I found Jack had an interesting and unique personality. He became, for me, a delight to encounter, eventually so familiar to one another that we traded jibes and personal experiences as I drove past or walked in and out.

I knew little more about him beyond knowing he served in the army and grew up in Encino and that he was possessed of good humor behind a usually smiling face. He was no longer faceless to me. Nor are Mary, Phil, Renee, or even Sgt. Camacho, all of whom I have gotten to know a little over the years.

With effort and luck, that applies to many of the other wonderful people who work here as well, people to whom many of us never give even a second thought.

I tell you this because Jack's face is one that we will not be seeing again, ever. Nor will I share his jokes and good wishes. A couple of weeks ago, Jack suffered a massive stroke. Not long after, we lost him and his laughter.

A reminder of our loss, in the words of John Donne:

No man is an Island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the Continent, a part of the main; if a Clod be washed away by the Sea, Europe is the less, as well as if a Promontory were, as well as if a Manor of thy friends or of thine own were; any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in Mankind; And therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; It tolls for thee.

So, Jack, I'll see you on the flip side. Maybe then we can have a beer we never had.

And josh one another again.

And I know you'll keep the bad guys out of whateverVillage you're in.

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

Day 12: In the morning, Bill and I went down to the area where all the vendors were. We had to pay to park our bikes and enter the vendors' tents. We walked around from about 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. I think that we saw all that they had there, but

EARTHQUAKE PREPAREDNESS

Post-quake help critical for seniors

A few weeks after the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake, the state Seismic Safety Commission held open hearings that solicited advice from senior citizens who had experienced hardships following the temblor. The commission focused on 75 or older seniors who suddenly lost their independence because of what happened to the contents of their homes.

Many elderly residents are unable to crawl under a table or desk, or move to a safer location in the home. Numerous injuries were caused by falls, moving furniture, and flying objects.

A 77-year-old woman described her most pressing needs after the quake. Even though she was not injured and her home was still habitable, she was unable to cope without assistance. She suffered with severe stress, and after two days was in a dehydrated, weakened condition. She could not sleep or eat. Everything that had been in her cupboards was on the floor, mixed with broken glass and spilled liquids. Her closets were a snarl of tangled, fallen clothing, and the contents of most cupboards and storage areas blocked rooms and hallways. She simply didn't have the strength or energy to start the tasks that had to be done.

Finally, help arrived when two concerned neighborhood teenage boys came to see how she was doing. They soon called two girls to join their efforts, and in a few hours the clean-up was finished and the scrambled contents from storage places were back in place. This senior citizen urgently recommended that

plans be made in advance to send volunteers to the homes of seniors to determine if they can cope with the effects of the earthquake.

Another suggestion that came from the hearing was to use people the victims know to assist the frail and

elderly with any required paperwork. Familiar people that they know and trust can help relieve stress and anxiety.

Several of the elderly reported they felt like they were in a foreign country. An 85-year-old widower said, "I sure signed a lot of papers. I don't even know what I signed."

Studies have proven that most males over 65 are prone to believing that their usefulness in a potential disaster has not diminished with age. The studies have also proven that good intentions are limited by physical fitness, which gradually degrades by the aging process.

Perhaps Leisure Village residents could develop a relationship with Camarillo High School students who would volunteer to check on specified residents following a strong, damaging earthquake. An educated guess would be that about 50 percent of LV residents could benefit from such an arrangement. School officials believe that such an arrangement would benefit both students and LV residents, and possibly create a model for senior communities across the state.
