New rules govern disposal of needles, other biohazards

In response to a resident's question, the following information was obtained by Leisure Village General Manager Bob Scheaffer:

After Sept. 1, 2008, home-generated sharps waste must be transported only in a sharps container. By definition, "home-generated sharps waste" means hypodermic needles, pen needles, intravenous needles, lancets, syringes and other devices that are used to penetrate the skin for delivery of medications derived from a household. You can pick up your free biohazard container at the following location, and when it is three-quarters full, return it for proper disposal and pick up a new container:

LV's Ruth Fridberg learns to survive, thrive

On May 13, 1939, the SS St. Louis set sail from Hamburg, Germany, to the destination of Havana, Cuba. On board were 936 Jewish refugees, including Ruth Fridberg, now a resident of V. 34, and her mother.

Along with the hope of starting a new life in a new country, free from Nazi persecution, Ruth and each of her fellow passengers were allowed to bring on board a few personal belongings, about \$10 per person, and a tourist visa to enter Cuba.

When the ship reached Cuba, the passengers were not allowed to disembark. The visas they had each purchased for \$250 were declared invalid. The pas-

sengers were asked to pay about \$500 additional per person in order to enter Cuba. A small number of passengers were somehow able to enter Cuba, and more than 900 left sadly, knowing they had been deceived and would have to return to Germany.

Aboard ship, Ruth and the other passengers were called to a meeting by the German captain of the ship, Gustav Schroeder. He told the passengers that he would not take them back to Germany. as he understood well the certain fate that would await them. He pledged that he would work on their behalf to find another country that would give them asylum from the Nazis.

Schroeder, anchored between Cuba and Florida, appealed to the government of the United States and asked for permission to land. Surely the United States, with its tradition of freedom and its commitment to the helpless, would offer its assistance in their dire need.

"Keep ancient lands, your storied pomp! Give me your tired,

your poor, Your huddled masses

yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.

Also in the Assembly Room were more than 40 different pumpkin based dishes in seven different categories.



Keep body, brain working

Scientists used to believe that people were stuck with the brain they were born with and that individuals naturally began to lose cognitive function as they aged. This thinking allowed people to accept memory loss as inevitable and believe that nothing could be done about it. However, new research shows that the brain constantly renews itself, giving hope to those with cognitive decline.

Recent research also reveals that frequent physical exercise has a direct correlation to brain function. Exercise stimulates stem cells to grow new brain cells in the memory part of the brain. Enhancing blood flow to the brain increases the density and size of the brain's capillaries, which, in turn, increases the amount of oxygen to the brain.

Studies show that a vigorous exercise program — one that gets the heart pumping fast — causes more blood flow to the brain, thereby providing the most benefits.

However, any exercise is good, so take a walk, work in your garden, lift weights and generally just get moving. The more you do, the better. Adding complexity to the exercise program, such as learning new dance steps, also helps the brain because it combines both physical and mental stimulation.

It's never too late to begin exercising. If you have trouble committing to a consistent workout program, then partner up with a spouse or friend. You will be more apt to stick with a program if there is another person counting on you.

Woodshop reopens after renovations

The woodshop was essentially shut down for about four weeks in September and October due to extensive renovations.

First, a nearly new 10-inch radial saw was donated to the shop, and it required rebuilding of that part of the shop work surface to accommodate it. This work was completed on Oct. 8 by Jim Ronge of the Woodshop Committee.

Second, the shop air compressor failed, and parts were ordered to repair it. They arrived on Oct. 5.

The muter, a woodworking machine, expired. This machine is used to make contoured pieces such as moldings and trim. Although parts were ordered, it proved unrepairable. This problem is,

as yet, unresolved. Finally, a new dust-

collector system was purchased. The system collects the dust and shavings from the woodworking machines to prevent explosions or health problems of the workers. This upgrade was required due to the large number of machines connected to the system, requiring a larger, more powerful system than we had in place. The new system arrived on Sept. 26 and required extensive modification of the shop storage area to accommodate it. A mounting was designed after many problems were identified and solved. The equipment weighed more than 200 pounds when fully assembled. A secure mounting was designed, and parts were fabricated

by a local welding shop. The actual mounting was accomplished using an automotive style hydraulic floor jack and several members of the Village staff to provide some needed muscle.

Woodshop Committee members involved in this project were Sid Alweiss, Nate Brutzkus, Ted Lansing, Bob Power, Jim Rouge and Chuck Russell. The system became operational on Wednesday, Oct. 22, putting the Woodshop back in business and available once again to serve the Village and its residents.

All keyholders will be required to visit the shop for explanation of new operational requirements for the dust system and the radial saw.



Important items to consider on the listing agreement are length of listing period, listing price and commission to broker. It is wise to allow the broker to put up a sign and install a lockbox, which holds a key allowing other agents to show the property. Be sure to take precautions to protect valuables that might be accessible during showings.

The listing agreement and purchase agreement both have dispute resolution information. The

seller should read this carefully to determine his/her legal choice regarding mediation, arbitration, litigation, etc. It is legal in California for a broker to represent both seller and buyer, which must be disclosed to the seller as soon as possible when presenting an offer.

President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, facing the pressure of re-election and a depression with 30 million Americans out of work, denied their request. An appeal was then sent to the Canadian government. Canada also refused.

As hope turned to disappointment, and then to fear, Ruth and the other passengers began to realize they were part of a propaganda ploy by Nazi Germany to demonstrate that the countries of the world were not sympathetic to the plight of the Jews. By refusing to respond to the appeals from the Jewish refugees on the SS St. Louis, these countries were effectively saying that the resolution was Germany's problem, not theirs, and Germany needed to solve it. And Nazi Germany, as history

How many times have you heard someone say, in conversation or in a letter or e-mail, "Rumor has it..." and then begin to tell you a story that is usually designed to shock you?

Computer users should note the Web site called "Snopes.com." It is an impartial, independently run service that keeps track of all the current rumors and older "urban legends" and prints them out along with comments on whether they're true or false. I have found it quite helpful.

It's not the only source; one can simply put the word "rumor" or the words "urban legend" in a search engine to come up with some alternative valuable sites. But no matter the source you use, when confronted with something that sounds like a rumor, it is best to stay skeptical and look for the facts. has shown, had its own ideas how to resolve the issue.

The captain selected a committee of passengers to help devise a way out of their predicament. Their plan was to set sail to the coast of England and secretly set the ship on fire. The passengers would then get on life boats and disembark on the shore. How could they be refused? They had no ship and no way back. This plan, however, was never executed; another option offered renewed hope. Appeals for assistance

had gone out to various countries in Europe. After much negotiation and after about 40 days at sea, Belgium, Holland, France and England finally agreed to each allow entry to the weary passengers. Ruth and her mother were relieved to get a chance to start over in England. Others were not as fortunate and ended up in the hands of the Nazis.

Of the original 936 Jewish refugees who set sail aboard the SS St. Louis, only about 250 survived.

Ruth Fridberg was able to find employment in England, and she worked there until the end of the war. In 1945 she came to the United States. She met her husband, Charles, in the United States, and they remained happily married until his death in the year 2000. She has been a resident of Leisure Village for the past 30 years. She is an avid reader and enjoys the serenity of life at Leisure Village.

Somehow, through all her difficult experiences, she remains to this day a positive and cheerful person. Amazing how Ruth's human spirit has survived, and thrived, and reflects even today in her kind and friendly smile!
