TEEN SISTERS PREGNANCY PREVENTION PROJECT

Submitting to Community Partners.

Funding Request: \$306,347

- The proposed Teen Sisters Pregnancy Project will provide supporting services to the identified high risk group of female siblings of pregnant/parenting teens.
- Result: increased school attendance, positive relationships with family and peers, postponement of sexual activity, and prevention of early pregnancy among female teens who are at particularly high risk of becoming adolescent parents.
- Case management and mentoring to work with non-pregnant, non-parenting female siblings of clients of the Ventura County Health Care Agency Family Life Program.
- Case managers will help these adolescents find other solutions of the problems and learn new techniques that will guide them through other life difficulties as well.
- Based upon the successful Ventura County ASPPP.
- Primary difference: emphasis on younger sisters of pregnant/parenting teens rather than on brothers and sisters;
- Targeted area of the community, identified as the highest risk for teen pregnancy, is the Latina siblings in the City of Oxnard in Ventura County.

Women's Economic Summit
