



The club has 124 members with 65 players active on the courts playing tennis, pickleball and paddle tennis. 44 club players participated in the Turkey Trot.





Storm Damage Relatively Small in Retrospect



Nerves were jangled in Village 17 when an early December rainstorm descended on Southern California. The rain was accompanied by some wind and a tree blew down on one unfortunate car. This event recalled last year's Santa Ana wind event on January 19, 2021 that did a substantial amount of damage to Village trees, roofs and homes.

A series of rainstorms in late December has put a temporary damper on the threat of another year of drought that was predicted to cause water delivery problems to the West. Some areas of Camarillo experienced over 10" of rain by December 27th with more storms predicted for that week.



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

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
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HISTORIC REFLECTION

Museum of Pleasant Valley History

Have you ever imagined what it was like living here "back in the day" when this area was a sleepy bucolic paradise? You can experience what it was like living in Camarillo, Springville and Somis before the railroad, before irrigation water and before the freeway. A visit to the Pleasant Valley Historical Museum is a visit back to that time.

The Pleasant Valley Historical Museum serves the community by preserving and presenting our local history. It gives visitors a glimpse of our heritage by sharing the legacy of those who brought their dreams to life in this area we now call home.

The museum collection includes over 2,000 objects, historical photographs, maps, newspapers, and even clothing of early California. The Fulkerson Library, with its collection of over a thousand old books and journals, an archive of rare Ventura County Quarterlies, and a trove of popular magazines dating from the '30s, contains many artifacts that cannot be found on the internet. There is even an original psychiatric manual from the State Mental Hospital. An old "card catalog" contains index cards filed for each object. [For another fun outing, you can visit the original Fulkerson Hardware store in Somis]

Museum exhibits include:

Two large maps — one of the original 1874 homesteads in "the forgotten triangle", and the other of "The Gore" as it was surveyed in 1900, showing the names of the people we now recognize as city

founders.

A collection of memorabilia owned by Juan Camarillo (Adolfo's other brother)

Artifacts and information about the 1880's Scholle Ranch house and the Cawelti family farm near the early community of Springville.

Brochures for early housing tracts in the area, including Leisure Village.

Documents on how E.W. Daily's

daughters started the Livingston Memorial Visiting Nurse Association and St. John's Hospital.

Other collections include over 100 telephones from different eras, along with other historic machines, documents and other aspects of life in Paradise Valley past and present.

After exploring the museum, visit the Charles Honn Botanical Garden to see butterflies and enjoy

as you walk along the wide concrete pathway through this secret garden.

You might want to visit this precious resource soon, as it will be closing temporarily in March for renovation and an expansion that will double the floor space. A WORD ON WINE

The Search for Balance in Wine

Tannin and acid are important characteristics of wine. They work together on the palette, creating a pleasing taste and mouthfeel. As the grapes ripen, the acidity level drops as the sugar level rises. Monitoring the grapes in the vineyard for sugar level and acidity (or Ph), the winemaker decides when to harvest the grapes.

Acids are sour and found in the pulp of the wine grape. They bring freshness and cause salivation. Too much acidity makes a wine seem tart and light, while too little acidity makes a wine taste cloying and flabby. Throughout the fermentation process, acidity of the wine is monitored as the winemaker balances it with the bitterness of tannins.

Tannins are extracted from the skins, stems, and seeds of the grapes as they cold soak in their own juice immediately after harvest. The amount of tannin extracted into the wine is determined by how much



time the juice spends in contact with the skins. By themselves, tannins cause an astringent, drying sensation at the back of the mouth. To taste tannin, brew a cup of black tea for 7 minutes, then taste it. The bitterness and puckery feeling come from tannins extracted from the tea leaves.

To experience how tannins and acids interact, try this. Take a glass of lemonade, an acidic drink, and a glass of tea, a tannic drink. Combine 1/3 of each to make an Arnold Palmer in a 3rd glass. Taste all three, ending with the 3rd glass. The Arnold Palmer is mellower than either of its components because acids and tannin interact with your taste buds to create the sensation of balanced taste.

Some grapes are inherently more tannic than others. Some refer to red wines as "strong," bringing to mind tannic wines like Cabernet Sauvignon or Syrah. But tannins aren't always in your face. They can be supple and smooth, like Merlot, or finely integrated and light, like Pinot Noir. The Sextant Cabernet Sauvignon we tasted at the December Wine Club session was a great example of a perfect red wine - well balanced with a pleasant tannin backbone and delightful acidity.

Whatever your preference, don't shy away from tannic wines. Trust the winemaker to get the right balance between tannin and acid. If your red wine is "puckery," pair it with a steak or a creamy cheese like Port Salut or Brie. Each wine you taste adds to your palette's memory, and if, one day, you find yourself savoring one of those "strong" wines, it will be partially due to a winemaker's deft hand in balancing tannins with acidity.

PEA, SPINACH AND CRAB RISOTTO

2 tbs. olive oil for frying

2 small shallots, sliced

Arborio rice 12 oz

Garlic 2 cloves, chopped

White wine 5 oz.

Chicken stock 37 oz.

Frozen baby peas 5 oz.

Parmesan cheese 2.5 oz, grated

2 pats low-fat butter

Lemon 1/2, juiced

GREEN SAÚCE

Spinach 7 oz.

Frozen baby peas 5 oz, defrosted

Extra-virgin olive oil 4 tbs

CRAB SALSA

Red onion 1/2, finely chopped

Crabmeat 8 oz.

Dried red chili - 3 shakes

Flat-leaf parsley a handful, chopped

Lemon ½, juiced

Step 1: Heat oil in a large heavy pan, fry the shallots on low until softened. Raise heat to medium, add rice and garlic, fry for 1 minute until rice is coated and turning translucent.

Step 2: Add wine (or use all stock), stirring all the time, letting it almost fully reduce. Slightly raise heat and slowly add stock, a ladle at a time, stirring regularly, only adding more once the last ladleful is absorbed. Season.



Step 3: Meanwhile, put the spinach, peas, olive oil and 2 tablespoons of water in a blender or food processor. Blitz to a smooth sauce, add more water if required.

Step 4: When rice is nearly cooked (about 25 minutes), stir in the green sauce. Keep stirring the risotto for 10 minutes, then stir in the peas, butter, parmesan, lemon.. Simmer for 5 minutes until rice

Step 5: Mix together crab salsa ingredients. Spoon risotto into the bowl, top with crab salsa and a drizzle of olive oil. Serve with lemon wedges and parmesan.




