Ted's Bench

There's a reminder on Leisure Village Drive between Villages 3 and 5 that life here can be a comfortable and rewarding combination of giving and receiving. A new bench donated in the memory of longtime resident Ted Lansing speaks to that legacy. Ted died in July 2020 at the age of 90. He lived here more than 15 years, and his wife Hanna wanted to contribute something that "would last forever," she says, as an expression of Ted's commitment to serving others.

The bench was the answer. Hanna says her only disappointment is that "There's no plaque big enough to list all of Ted's good works." He served as an LVA Board member and Treasurer for nearly a decade. He was an intense student of local and state regulations for homeowner associations and gave regular workshops called "LVA 101" to explain these rules to residents. (Those workshops were recorded, and the videos are available in our library.)

Ted was a member of the Woodshop, and his woodworking expertise was always available to those who brought their broken furniture to be repaired. He chaired the Architectural Committee for years. His ham radio skills connected him to people across the country during weekly practice sessions, and he participated in many emergency drills. He taught wilderness sur-

vival skills for the Sierra Club and emergency preparedness for the Red Cross. On his lighter side, Ted loved to perform in and also directed some Players Guild productions.

Hanna's hope is that the Lansing Bench, made of synthetic wood, is in a comfortable location allowing visitors to stop by, enjoy Leisure Village and remember Ted.

One of the recent challenges in this unprecedented frenetic market has been the appraisal process. They can be delayed due to a shortage of appraisers availability or the simple fact that some of the values are coming in low. One common strategy is to waive the appraisal contingency, this may not be an option when a lender is involved.

Three "new" members have been elected by voters to serve on the Leisure Village 2021-22 Board Directors. Based on 1124 valid ballots submitted, Chuck Kiskaden, Bob Bueling, and Richard Loomis will serve on the Board for the next two years. New to the Board is Richard Loomis, who has lived in the Village for three years. Chuck Kiskaden is a returning member of the Board, having served two terms before. And with this election win, Bob Bueling begins his second term on the Board of Directors. See photo on page 16.





HISTORIC REFLECTION By Max Copenhagen

History of Roads to Ventura County

The fertile coastal plain of Ventura County is surrounded by rugged mountains. Highway 101 is our busiest road, but here are the stories of other important routes.

Santa Susana Pass

First used by Spanish settlers in 1770, this route evolved into a rough wagon road. Funds were appropriated to improve it in 1859. When the Civil War disrupted mail service in 1861, the government contracted the Butterfield Company to carry mail between Los Angeles and San Francisco through the Santa Susana Pass. The steepest portion was called the Devil's Slide and horses were blindfolded for the steep descent. The passengers usually decided to walk. In 1895, the Chatsworth Grade bypass opened and was used until the Santa Susana Pass Road was built in 1917. This was the first automobile route between the San Fernando and Simi Valley and the main 'coast road' north until the Conejo Grade was improved.

the coastal mountains and the sea. During the "Mission Period," traveling by foot or horseback along the small alluvial beaches and coastal bluffs was difficult. Traffic would often be delayed by high tides, storms and rock slides. A longer route over Casitas Pass was the more likely route used to travel between the missions. A stagecoach route over Casitas Pass was built in 1861. Construction of the railroad provided an unimproved road, but it was often underwater. As the automobile age began, civic boosters in Ventura were eager to open a more direct coastal route between Ventura and Santa Barbara. They started raising funds to build a twenty foot wooden causeway. An automobile route along this portion

of the coast opened in 1913 with the Rincon Causeway or Rincon Sea Level Road. It was the first coastal road for motorists traveling between San Francisco and Los Angeles. A bridge over the Ventura River also opened at this time. In 1926, US 101 was established and the road was modernized with a concrete seawall and the rickety wooden road was removed.

Roosevelt Highway

The Roosevelt Highway, renamed the Pacific Coast Highway, is a 1,400-mile road from Canada to Mexico and our first direct link to Santa Monica. Since the 1890s, a primitive road hugged the rocky coast between Santa Monica and Malibu, only to reach a locked gate at the former Rancho Topanga. When the county proposed extending the coastal road, the ranch owner posted armed guards and challenged the county's authority. Eventually the Supreme Court granted the coun-

ty a right-of-way for \$107,289. Delayed by the litigation, the Malibu segment of the Roosevelt Highway was the last to open in 1929. The road was improved and cut through the ridge of volcanic rock at Point Mugu in 1937. By the 1950s, a new Pacific Coast Freeway was being planned, following the same route, bisecting coastal communities and restricting public access to beaches. The State began purchasing the rightof-way land in the 1960s, but the plan was abandoned in 1972 due to opposition by residents and environmental activists. Only a short section of it southeast of Oxnard 1928, the flood waters wiped out was ever built.

Highway 33

Highway or the Maricopa Highway, this amazingly scenic road winds through the Las Padres Mountain Summit. It is an important connection between the coast and the towns and oil fields of Kern County. Highway 33 was born as a campaign promise of Governor Hiram Johnson to connect all the county seats in California with paved roads. Work commenced upon his Gubernatorial victory in 1910.

Highway 126

Highway 126 is one of the original State Highways. This route along the Santa Clara River was easy access even before the railroad was built in 1887 to connect the citrus growers with markets inland. Within Ventura County, it was known as Telegraph Road. Flooding was a problem. When the St. Francis Dam failed in

roads and bridges along the entire route from Santa Clarita to Known as the Petroleum the shores at Oxnard. There were plans to make 126 a freeway. The first section was opened between Oxnard and Santa Paula in 1965. Mountains from Ojai thru The plan was abandoned in the Matilija Canyon and over Pine face of anti-development pressure and financial problems as a result of the 1971 Sylmar earthquake.

Mulholland Highway

In 1924, a road was built from Cahuenga Pass westward by developers investing in the Hollywood Hills. The State contracted a \$10-million improvement project in 1958 that would extend the Mulholland highway from Cahuenga Pass to the shores of North Malibu near Ventura County line. The 21-mile long two-lane road loosely follows the ridges of the Santa Monica Mountain Range, then continues through the mountains to the Pacific Ocean at Leo Carrillo State Beach.



A PINCH OF SALT

Rocky J. Squirrel - VS - LV Squirrel

Squirrels: you either love 'em cause they are cute and fuzzy or you instead of eating potato chips with call them rats with fluffy tails. You probably don't like them cause' they eat the strawberries in your garden. Or, like me, you always think of Rocky the flying squirrel whenever you see one and maybe hear the nuts or blanched (skins removed) voice of the great June Foray.

All of this crossed my mind the other day as I watched a squirrel dart across the lawn and up a tree in seconds. I thought he was being pursued but there are not many squirrel predators living in Leisure Village. Yea, an occasional coyote or a delusional terrier, but they can't climb trees, mostly. My inner Rocky knows there are plenty of yummy fruits and vegetables over in the garden (shhh) by the tennis courts so I guess an LV squirrel's life is not really that bad; although my friend Rudy swears that they are terrible gin rummy partners.

And so, I thought if I'm wrong and there is an afterlife and I can't come back as Rocky J. Squirrel, I'll come back as a Leisure Village Squirrel (LVS for short). If I did come back as a squirrel, I'd have to change my eating habits. Squirrels don't eat fried Oyster Po' boys and garlic shrimp rigatoni. They do enjoy nuts, seeds, tree flowers and tree buds from a variety of trees including butternut, cedar, dogwood, elm, pine, hemlock. Cedar Tree Buds with Fried Hemlock Seeds - yuck (slight shudder).

During the summer months, your favorite cocktail or beverage, try these squirrel inspired crunchy, flavorful and wholesome snacks:

Herbed Peanuts/Almonds

This works best with no salt peaalmonds. If you are ambitious, it's much cheaper to buy raw almonds and skin them yourself but it is a lot more effort.

I use one of those metal pie pans. Spray it lightly with olive or canola oil. Cover the pan with nuts, a little more than makes a single layer. Sprinkle with your favorite dried herbs and stir them in. Shake the pan well to coat all sides. Roast at 325 degrees. WATCH CLOSELY AND SHAKE REGULARLY.

Sea Salt and Black Pepper Nuts

For this one, after placing nuts in the pan, spray lightly with oil, sprinkle with sea salt and fresh ground black pepper. Shake the pan well to coat all sides. Roast at 325 degrees. WATCH CLOSELY AND SHAKE REGULARLY.

Dilled Nuts

Same process as above only use dried dill & sea salt. Roast at 325 degrees. WATCH CLOSELY AND SHAKE REGULARLY.

Asian Inspired Curry Nuts

Again same process as above only use roasted sesame oil, curry powder and crushed red pepper but roast for 4-5 minutes, then remove and add low sodium Tamari (soya

sauce without the wheat so gluten free) toss to coat and continue roasting until done BUT WATCH CLOSELY AND SHAKE REG-ULARLY.

LVS and Rocky will watch from the trees, envious of your nutty gourmet snacks.

A WORD ON WINE

Old Vine Wine – Hype or Real Deal?

A frequent question we are asked is "Does the age of a vinevard affect the wines made from its grapes?" The answer is definitely yes. It takes three years before a newly planted vine yields grapes that make decent wine. Throughout each year the vines must be carefully pruned and tended as the roots dig deeper into the soil searching for water and nutrients. The older a vine, the more finely tuned the plant is to its specific microclimate and the more complex the grapes. As the years pass, vines develop thick, gnarled trunks and may look stressed. The yield of fruit is lower from these vines as they age, but they continue to produce wonderfully flavorful grapes for making elegant wines. Therein lies the mystique of an old vine wine.

There is no universally agreed definition of the often used "old vines" that appears on wine labels. In a well-established wine region, it can mean a wine from vines over thirty-five years old, while, in newer wine regions, twenty years might be considered old. In the U.S., the most common use of old vine designation is for Zinfandel. In California some vineyards up to 125 years old are still bearing small amounts of prized Zinfandel fruit.

In the Barossa Valley of Australia, the world's oldest continually producing commercial vineyard is believed to be the Shiraz vines at Turkey Flat, originally planted in 1847. The Barossa Old Vine Charter was established to protect the older vines in the region and prevent them from being removed to plant new vineyards. Part marketing and part conservation, this has enabled the oldest producing Barossa vineyards to profit from the unique richness of their grapes over 100 years old.

We were curious to compare Shiraz from ancient gapes to those from more typical vines. The Barossa Old Vine Charter lists "old vine" vineyards by age and winery. Searching wine distributors helped us find the wines from those an-

cient vines. The prices can vary and swayed our decision. For the comparison, we bought two bottles of Shiraz from each of two wineries. One was from ancient vines and the other was from ordinary vines. We ordered a 101 year old vine Shiraz from Yalumba winery and a 124 year old vine from Elderton Estate, as well as a "regular vine" Shiraz from each winery. To tell the truth, we both expected to be underwhelmed by the difference, since, regardless of vine age, all the wines were relatively young, being made less than five years ago.

The bottles were open and breathing as a small group of friends gathered around the tasting table. Using a Vinturi to aerate the wine, Don poured a pair of glasses for the Yalumba winery. Now for the moment of truth... Sh-zam! There was a very apparent difference! The wine from ancient vines had a more intense nose and richer color than the wine from regular vines. The distinction became even more apparent in the comparative

tasting, as the ancient vine wine presented a delicious jammy flavor in an elegant wine. The other Shiraz was well made and also delicious, but did not have the depth of the old vine wine. We repeated this with the pair of wines from Elderton Estate and got the same results. In the end, it was a very instructive and tasty evening, and the premium price for the old vine wines was decidedly worth it.

The "take home" from the evening; well tended old vines are survivors that are the real deal, they lead to great wines.

PERSPECTIVES

If you gained more than five pounds during the notorious pandemic, it might not have all been your fault. Read on:

The main issues with pandemic life—sheltering in place, remote work and study, lack of exercise and activity, and just plain unhealthy eating—all contributed to weight gain. We are social creatures and like to practice such things as our routine activities, workouts, meetings, in concert with others who share our interests. For over 14 months, that socializing was verboten.

An American Dietetic Association survey of 3,000 Americans reveals that two out of five adults gained significant amounts of weight—20 to 29 pounds since the onset of the pandemic. One in ten reported a gain of 50 pounds.

This is serious! Overweight and obesity categories in adults hit record gains during the 14-month period of sequestration. Aside from personal habits, there is a knowledge gap. Amazingly, medical schools in the U.S. focus no more instruction on nutrition than they did 50 years ago. The topic gets less than 1% of classroom time with aspiring physicians. In America, the food and beverages ingested by people today are the biggest drivers of disease.

Consequently, practicing doctors today have no conception of how food processing, calorie-dense takeout foods, and unhealthy elements, especially sugar and salt—combined with a lack of exercise—have undermined health, and are responsible for the decline in life expectancy in recent years.

"Not all calories are the same," according to Dr. Robert H. Lustig, who authored the new best seller *Metabolical*. (The book title is a play on words.) The author stated, "Nutrition labels on packaged foods are mostly irrelevant—what you really need to know is what's been done

to the food, and no label will tell you. Improving the nation's health depends on the medical profession focusing on preventing disease, not simply treating it."

Meanwhile, let's concentrate our dietary habits on "real food" that is low in sugar and high in fiber—important for optimal bodily and mental functioning. Fresh fruits and vegetables can't be beat; and the commitment to such a plan can have the rewards you desire.


