Claudia Balke

If anyone wants help planning their landscape beds, Claudia Balke is the person to see.

Balke planted her first garden when she was only eight years old and now, she works with Committee Chair Don Marquardt and helps Leisure Village residents plan their gardens.

"I like to help homeowners, I like to make a difference," Balke said. "I want to keep the village beautiful as much as I can contribute to that."

The first thing Balke did after moving to Leisure Village in 2009 was attend a landscape committee meeting. At the time it was a full committee headed by Jerry Sortomme, a horticulturist who was happy to do it all. She was able to eventually persuade him to let her do more, and after he and a succeeding chairman moved on, she took over. But she didn't want

to be chair of the LV Landscape Committee, so Don Marquardt assumed that role and they work as a committee of two. She is also the landscape liaison to the Building and Grounds Committee.

Plants have always been a big part of Balke's life.

Claudia grew up in Munich, Germany. "I was an only child and I had to be quiet, so plants were perfect," she said. "Nature was my savior. I got to know plants and insects and birds and started researching it as a child and that's how you get into it."

She came to the United States in 1967 with her first husband. They raised three sons and eventually bought a house in New Hampshire with a big yard. "I was in heaven," she said. "I had perennial gardens, I had a rose garden."

When other women shopped at

the mall, Balke spent her money at a nursery.

"My big Mother's Day gift was a trip to the nursery," she said.

After a divorce, Balke began a 35-year career in finance but still managed to keep up her gardening. After her second husband passed away and she retired, she followed her children's advice to join them in Southern California. She fell in love with Leisure Village.

Although she loved the house, she didn't love the landscaping and had it all taken out and replanted with her own choice of plants. "But I have a lot of plants that are approved so when the day comes I have to hand it over to the village, I don't have to replace much," she said.

Balke advises people who want to make changes in their landscaping to first fill out a landscape permit application. She will make an

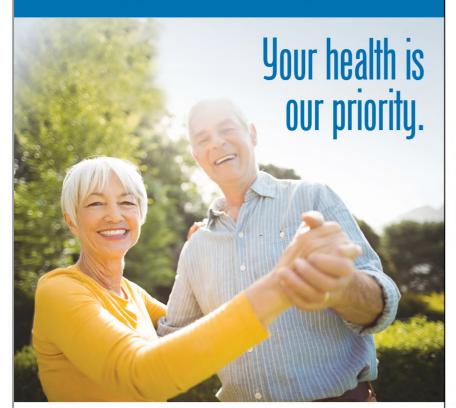

Our Aching Feet - What to Know/What Shoes to Wear to Get Happier Feet

For years, I have been recommending patients to spend more money on their shoes (and mattress), and to buy less expensive clothes as the body doesn't care about clothes for physical health and well being. We like to have nice shoes, but to be kind to support and cushion our aging feet, being knowledgeable about changes to your feet as you age and knowing what makes a good walking shoe is imperative for happy feet.

Women, especially when we are younger tend to wear fashionable shoes that have heels and other features not condusive to foot and toe health. Men in general wear flatter and better shoes, but tend not to want to spend more money on their shoes.

Changes to Your Feet as You Age, shoes become more of a challenge

• Your feet will change in shape and size as you age, and your needs in footwear will vary depending on various conditions

- It is normal for your foot to grow in width and length as you age; it is normal to have your shoe size increase by half a size or more
- You may experience foot and/ or ankle swelling due to circulation challenges or medication side effects or other health conditions; you may need a larger pair of shoes to fit properly if your feet are swollen
- As we age, we slowly lose the fat pad that cushions the bottom of the foot; cushioned shoes and inserts are recommended
- Dry skin as you age can lead to calluses and cracked skin especially on your heels – lotion your feet with a lotion that contains Ceramides
- Bunions, hammertoes, arthritis and other foot conditions can develop or worsen as you age; women you may experience the long-terms effects of wearing shoes with pointed toes and elevated heels
- You may lose flexibility as you age and have difficulty bending over

to reach your toes

- Foot problems due to diabetes more than one in four people have diabetes after age 65; this often results in loss of blood circulation and sensation in the feet; avoid the shoe rubbing on your foot and blisters
- Our balance is affected as we age, so it is recommended to wear non-slip soles and enough structure for good support

What constitutes a good shoe for walking around Leisure Village

- Running shoes are better than walking shoes
- Get running shoes that are comfortable, provide support and padding
- Don't buy less expensive running shoes buy toward the top of the line to get the best shoe you do get what you pay for
- Wearing a quality pair of running shoes reduces pressure on our low back, knees, ankles and feet, because they are designed

and use technology and materials, which are lightweight, offer superb cushioning and responsive shock absorption.

- Important have at least two comfortable pairs of good quality running shoes as each pair of shoes should have 24 hours of rest after wearing; alternate your shoes for best support and longevity of the shoes
- Replace your running shoes after the treads on the bottom wear out and/or the integrity of the shoe is lost and doesn't provide good support

Our feet carry us through our life and we can make them happier with care and better shoes! Let's walk for health in better shoes and care for our feet – see you walking in the Village sometime soon.

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A WORD ON WINE

Chilled Wines For Summer

■ Patio Pounding in Style

There's something wonderful about sipping a cool wine on the patio as the sun begins to dip. While white wines are the usual choice for chilling, some red wines also can be enjoyed slightly chilled. Summer is a time to explore new wines and old favorites, all served with a bit of a chill.

How about Malvasia Bianca? Originating in Sicily, here's a wine to wake your palette up. Sniffing a glass of Malvasia Bianca is like walking through an orange grove when the trees are blooming. Finished as a dry wine, it's very crisp and refreshing. We recently enjoyed this wine with village friends who got it from an Arizona winery south of Sedona.

A Dry Riesling is also an excellent quaff on a warm summer evening. Why? Because it's the wine version of the cooling drinks you're already drinking - tangy, fruited Margaritas, Mojitos and Mai Tais. Check the label to make sure it says "Dry."

As far as summer wines go, it's difficult to beat the refreshing qualities of a well-crafted Rosé. There are different ways to produce Rosé, but the result is similar—crisp acidity, a blush pink color and an exceptionally light body. At the Wine Club Picnic last month, we savored a wonderful Rosé of Pinot Noir.

And how about red wines?



From the center of France, Beaujolais is a popular summer wine that gets its intense minerality from the granite hillsides. Fruity, juicy, and very easy to drink, Beaujolais can be paired with practically any protein, including various types of seafood. Chill for 30 minutes and it will be ready to serve.

Barbera is an extremely drinkable red from Italy, and, fortunately, it's relatively affordable. Served well chilled, Barbera is the wine that wine makers throughout Italy drink rather than exporting. There's simply no better wine to drink alongside a slice or two of pizza.

Lastly, Pinot Noir wines are particularly good summer reds because they are lighter in body and are best enjoyed served slightly chilled. Although the highest quality Pinot Noir wines are expensive, there are moderately priced ones that are perfect for casual meals out on the patio.

Summer won't last long, so pick one of these delicious summer wines, get outside and enjoy the sunshine!

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A PINCH OF SALT

Pomodoro Fresca, Aglio e Olio

I planted my tomatoes a few weeks ago but the other farmers' garden tomato growers are far ahead of me. If my production is anything like last year's, I'm gonna have a bumper crop and since tomatoes are loaded with a powerful antioxidant, lycopene, I thought it was a good idea to have a few dishes in my brain ahead of time so I bought a nice large heirloom tomato the other day for use in one of my favorite easy summer tomato dishes. It is easily adaptable into Puttanesca, another classical Italian red sauce. All the sauce ingredients must be fresh, not frozen, dried or canned or tubed.

You will need (for one)

- 1 large red tomato, preferably homegrown or heirloom
 - 1 large garlic clove
 - 2 tbsp Extra virgin olive oil
 - 4 large fresh basil leaves

Black pepper

Block of Parmesan Italian (not from any other country)

Place the tomato in hot but not boiling water for appx. 15 seconds, remove with a slotted spoon. Allow a few minutes to cool, peel and finely dice, then place in a bowl with ALL the juices. Meanwhile, mince the garlic. Add olive oil to a saucepan. When warmed, add the garlic and stir constantly for appx 1 minute till golden but watch carefully, do not allow it to brown. Add tomatoes, 4-5 grinds of black pepper and a dash of salt. Sauté on very low heat until at least ½ of the liquid has cooked into the tomatoes—about 12-15 minutes.

Cook spaghetti, fettuccine or any of your favorite pastas, drain, plate and cover. Roll the basil leaves together and cut into thin strips. Grate a good coating of cheese over

the sauce, sprinkle the basil on top and have a nice trip to heaven.

Now, if you prefer something a little more "seasoned" the next day or soon thereafter, double this recipe and refrigerate the leftovers. Next day, make it into a Puttanesca sauce. Pour the sauce into a small saucepan, add a thsp of capers, one really smushed anchovy, 5 or 6 green olives pitted and sliced; simmer slowly for about 8-10 minutes. You could even add some red pepper flakes and it becomes a take on Arrabiata sauce.

Accompany these pastas with a tossed green salad with a simple not too overpowering dressing-white balsamic vinegar vinaigrette would be perfect, a crusty Italian roll, and a glass of Sangiovese or Sicilian red.

"They see a small picture and don't really know what the plant looks like," she said. "I like to show people what you can do."

Sheila Swan is one of the homeowners Balke has helped. She bought a house in Village 16 and didn't realize it was owner maintained. She wanted to have the village take it over.

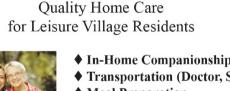
"Claudia came up with a sketch of plants that would do well in my yard," Swan said. "It took pressure away from me. She was just fantastic."

Balke said she's always been drawn to nature. "It's hard to explain — I look at that hydrangea over there and my heart overflows."

Balke's nurturing extends beyond the garden. She shares her home with an adopted greyhound, Goldie, and Hobo, a cat she rescued as a starving kitten.

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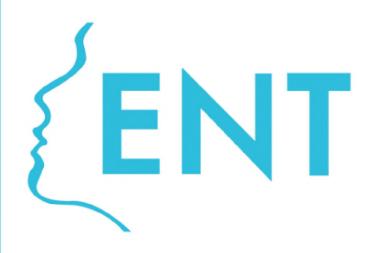

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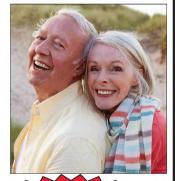
